The Singita Community Culinary School (SCCS) offers young people from neighbouring local villages the opportunity to become professional chefs with a full scholarship. This includes an intensive year-long culinary course, followed by a six-month work internship. Singita proudly partners with the globally renowned Prue Leith Culinary Institute, a leading academic quality assurance and accreditation provider. Graduates of the SCCS earn a highly acclaimed, internationally recognised City & Guilds Level 2 Diploma in Professional Cookery, complemented by WSET Level 1 Wine certification and essential Fire Safety and First Aid qualifications.

GRADUATE IMPACT STORY



A special impact story from one of our proud SCCS Alumni students, Mavis Ngobeni.

In 2007, she embarked on an incredible journey as one of six students selected for the first SCCS intake at Singita Kruger National Park. Mavis notes how she learnt essential skills like teamwork, resilience, and time management. Now Head Chef at Lion Sands Tinga Lodge, leading a team of 22, she credits her training at SCCS for equipping her to overcome challenges, support her family, and build a brighter future.

"I never imagined cooking could be a career. Growing up, I loved my mother's meals and wanted to cook like her, but my dream was to become a doctor. When my parents could not afford university, I thought my future was uncertain. Then came the life-changing opportunity to train at the Singita Community Culinary School." Her advice to aspiring chefs is simple but powerful: "Set goals for yourself, stay focused, and never stop learning. Picture your success and remind yourself of your dreams every day. Nothing is too hard for a determined person."

Thanks to the generosity of Singita guests and donors, the SCCS has achieved tremendous success since opening its doors in 2007.

Early Childhood Development (ECD)

The Singita Lowveld Trust (SLT) currently supports 17 Early Childhood Development (ECD) centres across nine villages bordering Singita Sabi Sand and Kruger Park. The SLT ECD Programme supports our ECD partners in providing a safe and stimulating environment for learning and play.

2024 HIGHLIGHTS

2,096

CHILDREN (AGED 0 - 5 YEARS) benefitted from access to quality care and education in 67 fully equipped classrooms. 703 students have graduated in 2024 and will be moving into Grade R in 2025.

Practitioners expressed their gratitude for the opportunity, highlighting how the training improved their understanding of the daily programme, lesson plans, and the practical application of the Early Learning Development Areas (ELDAs). They requested further training sessions for other staff members to continue building on their knowledge.

"The training really helped us understand the ELDAs better and how we apply them in everything we do with the children. We did not know that one activity could cover multiple ELDAs at once. Mr. Makwakwa made NCF feel easy to implement, and we're excited to start using what we've learned."

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

INFRASTRUCTURE

With the support of a loyal Singita guest donor and in partnership with the NGO Wild Impact, the Singita Lowveld Trust (SLT) funded the construction of a double classroom at the Ganyani ECD Centre. This project expands capacity for more children to access educational development through play.

APPROXIMATELY 500 DURABLE, AGE-APPROPRIATE

Thanks to generous guest donations, the ECD programme was able to support critical initiatives, including resourcing the ECD centres and training the trainers. These contributions allowed us to equip classrooms with essential materials such as books, puzzles, blocks, mats, desks, and chairs, significantly enhancing the learning environment for the children.

CLASSROOM INVESTMENT:

On average, it costs about USD 3,500 per classroom to ensure that each space is fully equipped with age-appropriate resources. This includes desks, bookshelves, chairs, and educational tools that allow teachers to provide an engaging learning environment for the children.

STORM RELIEF EFFORTS IN MPUMALANGA AND LIMPOPO

IMPACT OF THE STORM:

In October 2024, a severe storm struck Mpumalanga and Limpopo, with Bushbuckridge in Mpumalanga being the worst affected. 41 schools were heavily damaged, leaving classrooms unusable and creating urgent rebuilding challenges.

REPAIR COSTS:

Repairs are estimated to cost USD 10,500, highlighting the urgent need for intervention.

COLLABORATIVE RESPONSE:

In response, SLT joined forces with Sabi Sands Pfunanani Trust, Yellowwoods, Sutton Place, The Church of Transfiguration, and Wild Impact to launch the Storm Damage Response Project, aimed at supporting affected families and schools.

Key Repairs Include:

- Roofing for classrooms and buildings
- Plumbing and toilet repairs
- Fencing and security upgrades
- Garden and outdoor area repairs
- General renovations and maintenance

COMMITMENT TO REBUILDING:

This collaborative effort demonstrates the organisations' commitment to restoring safe learning environments and supporting community recovery.

TSHOKWANE RANGERS SCHOOL

Supported the resourcing of the SANParks Tshokwane Rangers Children's Holiday School, funding the purchase of educational and art materials for a range of environmental education activities.

By equipping emerging entrepreneurs with vital skills and financial resources, the Hustle Economy Programme nurtures resilience within the informal economy, aligning with SLT's mission to promote sustainable, self-reliant communities.

The Hustle Economy Programme empowers local entrepreneurs to establish and scale sustainable businesses, fostering a thriving local economy and reinforcing community resilience.

In partnership with Wild Impact, SLT ensures The Hustle Economy programme's sustainability and growth through financial support that enables tailored mentorship, investment grants and business training for local entrepreneurs. This investment reflects SLT's commitment to collaborations that benefit neighbouring communities by fostering economic independence. Along with annual funding for the Hustle Economy Programme, SLT recently launched a guest experience that has funded 30 grants for Hustle-preneurs.

Justicia Digital Learning Campus

The SLT is a proud core funder, contributing annually to the operational costs of the Good Work Foundation's Justicia Digital Learning Campus. This vital partnership delivers transformative education to neighbouring communities, equipping young people with essential computer literacy and life skills .

PROGRAMME HIGHLIGHTS:

808 Learners

are currently enrolled in the Open Learning Academy (OLA), which focuses on foundational literacy, numeracy, and digital skills for school-age children.

58 students

are participating in the Bridging Year Academy (BYA), an intensive post-school programme designed to build technology proficiency, English fluency, and career readiness.

Through this collaboration, the Justicia Campus promotes digital literacy and creates meaningful pathways to employment opportunities, particularly for youth in rural areas.

By championing innovative educational models, the SLT and the Good Work Foundation empower learners from neighbouring communities with the tools and confidence to thrive in an ever-evolving digital landscape.


DEHORNING PROGRAMME:

CARE FOR WILD RHINO SANCTUARY:

SLT launched the Care for Wild guest experience where the cost of the experience contributes directly to fund the care, recovery, and rewilding of rhino orphans at the sanctuary. One such orphan supported by SLT is Mavic, a now thriving 2.5-yearold orphan from SSNR, reaching his proud one tonne mark.

MAVIC UPDATE:

Thriving alongside his crash—Aquazi, Jock, and Zuri—Mavic is learning essential grazing patterns and navigating the vibrant veld. This shared journey is crucial for their rewilding, equipping them with the skills needed for a successful return to the wild.
