### Report on the Audit of the Annual Financial Statements

#### Qualified opinion

We have audited the annual financial statements of Shack Dwellers International (South Africa) NPO set out on pages 10 to 21, which comprise the statement of financial position as at 31 March 2019, and the statement of comprehensive income, statement of changes in equity and statement of cash flows for the year then ended, and notes to the annual financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies.

In our opinion, except for the possible effect of the matter described in the basis for qualified opinion section of our report, the annual financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Shack Dwellers International (South Africa) NPO as at 31 March 2019, and its financial performance and cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with the basis of accounting as described in note 1 to the annual financial statements and the requirements of the Non-profit Organisations Act No.71, 1997.

#### Basis for qualified opinion

In common with similar organisations, it is not feasible for the organisation to institute controls over donations and other income received prior to the initial entry in the accounting records. Accordingly, it was impractical for us to extend our examinations beyond the receipts actually recorded.

We conducted our audit in accordance with International Standards on Auditing. ### Committee Members' Report

The committee members submit their report on the annual financial statements of Shack Dwellers International (South Africa) NPO for the year ended 31 March 2019.

#### 1. Nature of operations

The organisation is established as a charitable institution of a public character, with the object of liasing with and coordinating the activities of groups and organisations internationally and within the Republic of South Africa, which consist of support communities living in shacks or other informal housing, with the aim of assisting and empowering such groups and organisations in their quest for land and formal housing, by way of the exchange of skills, resources, ideas and strategies.

There have been no material changes to the nature of the organisation's operations from the prior year.

#### 2. Organisation results for the financial year

SDI's vision is for resilient and inclusive cities that improve the lives of the urban poor. SDI seeks to transform slums into resilient neighborhoods and inclusive cities by collectively driving a women-led, bottom-up change agenda for securing tenure, and increasing access to basic services, housing, and livelihoods. The financial year ending 31 March 2019 marked the first year of SDI's new 5 year Strategic Plan for the period 2018-2022. The Strategic Plan is ambitious as it is bold and developed to articulate the network's consensus on the direction and priorities for the next 5 years. It outlines the network's objectives across three pathways of change: settlement, city, and global. SDI is also focused on building and supporting institutions across the network at all levels to ensure our capacity of delivering this change. It will support the network to take decisions regarding investment of time and resources that are in accordance with a vision of success for the period and guide the network in its operations and support the communication of SDI's strategy both inside and outside of the network. SDI is unique in a development sector where strategies to address urban poverty are dominated by consultants and specialists in that it continues to channel, resources directly to the urban poor through their own organizations and where solutions and implementation for change are designed solely by the poor.

Over this financial period, SDI has begun significant efforts towards the development of a more user friendly data platform as a first step towards the translation of the thousands of community profiles and household enumerations carried out by SDI federations into analysis and visualizations that are easy for communities to make use of in their engagements with government, donor agencies, academia, and other critical urban decision makers. The development of SDI's own in-house data platform, sdinet.io, is an important step in this regard, challenging dominant proprietary data systems built to exclude the poor from participation in city decision making. This platform hopes to demonstrate the critical role of slum data produced for the poor themselves, and re-frame the role of slum dwellers in urban decision making processes.

Over the past year, SDI has begun to engage with experts to develop innovative strategies to increase impact of our data work, develop new finance mechanisms, and income streams for the network, and effect greater change through large scale slum upgrading efforts. Notably, this year saw the establishment of a UPFI Governing Body, and advisory committee to the SDI Board whose work will support SDI to both ensure greater alignment of capital projects with SDI's core mission and theory of change while at the same time assisting the network to develop projects that attract impact investment from new finance sources. At the same time, SDI is working with experts in the innovative finance space to map out a strategy for SDI to access existing innovative financing, explore potential impact investment opportunities, and develop innovative pro-poor finance mechanisms for large scale upgrading projects that maintain the poorest of the poor as their primary demographic.

SDI has used the Know Your City initiative to broaden reach and scale over the past year, building partnerships with communities in Latin America and Asia through data collection activities. Through grants to community-based organizations and their support NGOs in ten different Latin American countries, SDI has created the foundation for partnerships with critical actors in the region. In addition, joint data-collection exercises with longstanding partner Asian Coalition for Housing Rights have deepened SDI's relationship with this partner organization whose reach spans some of the Global South's most urbanized nations. These successes have confirmed that the KYC campaign is a key vehicle for expanding the reach of the network, allowing SDI to engage with a broader range of partners and increase impact.

SDI aimed to deepen its engagements with youth as federation leadership have embraced their role as mentors and have begun to acknowledge the valuable role they play in bridging generational and technical gaps. Increasingly, and thanks to SDI's Know Your City TV youth media programme, federations are entrusting youth to document their stories, history, and interventions. Through these engagements, historical knowledge is transferred while creating documentation of federations' vast work over the years. Youth are able to provide a much needed skill while gaining understanding of the larger federation agenda.

SDI continued to work to build communities of the urban poor's capacity to negotiate and get governments to prioritize incremental, in situ upgrading, and energy justice. Here we continue to see concrete and directly attributable improvements to the built environment and people's living conditions through upgrading projects. SDI's Board and Council in reflecting the nature and complexities of such upgrading projects across the network has invested in building learning centres across a number of 'flagship' projects whose, scale and innovation around policy and practice is ground breaking. Such projects as the Mukuru Special Planning Area in Nairobi, Kenya, Vusi Nstutsha in Cape Town, South Africa, and the Jinja Kampala Express Relocation Programme in Uganda have all provided the network with a ground to deepen learning. City officials are increasingly incorporated in city-to-city learning exchanges with communities on such projects, generating partnership agreements between federations and officials in many cities. Documentation of such learning is robust and digitized and thus feeds not only exchange participants, but also the network more broadly. Project-linked data show the change to peoples' lives in terms of increased access to secure tenure and basic services.

SDI aimed to make sure the urban poor network consolidates their position as a central contributor to the formulation and implementation of the global urban agenda. In the year under review SDI made significant strides in advocating for voices of the urban poor in the global climate change discourse. The Chair of the SDI Board, Sheela Patel, was appointed as UN Global Commission for Adaptation. In this role Ms. Patel has also made representation of the effects of climate change on the urban poor and how they can be better integrated in providing effective adaptation and mitigation strategies at the local level. She has represented SDI at the International Scientific Conference on Cities and Climate Change in March 2018, the Global Climate Summit in September 2018, as well at the United Nations Climate Change Conference held in December 2018.

SDI continues to be a global player on advocacy efforts aimed at pushing for the recognition of the urban poor's initiatives and calling for partnerships and resourcing of initiatives to achieve global agendas such as the SDGs and the NUA. The challenge that continues to face the network is to ensure these new policy opportunities translate into concrete implementation strategies and increased finance flows to inclusive upgrading of informal settlements. Finally, a key success for advocacy was the increasing role of community-produced content for advocacy, learning, and knowledge spearheaded by SDI's Know Your City TV initiative.

## **Accounting Policies**

#### 1. Presentation of annual financial statements

The annual financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis in accordance with the accounting policies as set out below. The annual financial statements have been prepared on the historical cost basis. They are presented in South African Rands.

These accounting policies are consistent with the previous period.

#### 1.1 Property, plant and equipment

Property, plant and equipment are tangible assets which the company holds for its own use or for rental to others and which are expected to be used for more than one period.

Property, plant and equipment is initially measured at cost.

Cost includes costs incurred initially to acquire or construct an item of property, plant and equipment and costs incurred subsequently to add to, replace part of, or service it. If a replacement cost is recognised in the carrying amount of an item of property, plant and equipment, the carrying amount of the replaced part is derecognised.

Property, plant and equipment is subsequently stated at cost less accumulated depreciation and any accumulated impairment losses, except for land which is stated at cost less any accumulated impairment losses.

Depreciation of an asset commences when the asset is available for use as intended by management. Depreciation is charged to write off the asset's carrying amount over its estimated useful life to its estimated residual value, using a method that best reflects the pattern in which the asset's economic benefits are consumed by the company.

The useful lives of items of property, plant and equipment have been assessed as follows:

The depreciation charge for each period is recognised in reserves.

Depreciation is not charged to an asset if its estimated residual value exceeds or is equal to its carrying amount.

Gains or losses arising from the deregnition of an item of property, plant and equipment is recognised directly to reserves when the item is derecognised. The gain or loss arising from the deregnition of an item of property, plant and equipment is determined as he difference between the net disposal proceeds, if any, and the carrying amount of the item.

### **Accounting Policies**

#### 1.2 Financial instruments

#### Initial recognition and measurement

Financial instruments are recognised initially when the company becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instruments.

The company classifies financial instruments, or their component parts, on initial recognition as a financial asset, a financial liability or an equity instrument in accordance with the substance of the contractual arrangement.

Financial instruments are measured initially at fair value, except for equity investments for which a fair value is not determinable, which are measured at cost and are classified as available for sale financial assets.

For financial instruments which are not at fair value through profit or loss, transaction costs are included in the initial measurement of the instrument.

### Subsequent measurement

Available for sale financial assets are subsequently measured at fair value.

#### 1.3 Leases

A lease is classified as a finance lease if it transfers substantially all the risks and rewards incidental to ownership to the lessee. A lease is classified as an operating lease if it does not transfer substantially all the risks and rewards incidental to ownership.

#### Operating leases - lessee

Operating lease payments are recognised as an expense over the lease term.

Any contingent rentals are expensed in the period they are incurred.

#### 1.4 Employee benefits

#### Short-term employee benefits

The cost of short-term employee benefits, (those payable within 12 months after the service is rendered, such as paid vacation leave and sick leave, bonuses, and non-monetary benefits such as medical care), are recognised in the period in which the service is rendered and are not discounted.

### 1.5 Income recognition

Grant income is generally brought into account in the period in which the related expenditure is incurred. All other income is accounted for as and when received.

Accordingly, deferred income comprises grant income received in advance for the period to which it relates, is excluded from income, and is accounted for as a current liability.

#### 1.6 Foreign exchange

### Foreign currency transactions

Transactions denominated in foreign currency are recorded at the functional currency spot rate on the date of the transactions.

At each reporting date, monetary assets, that are denominated in foreign currencies, are translated to the entity's functional currency, applying the spot rate on the reporting date. The exchange differences so arising, are recognised directly in the UPFI Revolving Fund in the statement of changes in reserves.
