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The Robert Colescott Estate Joins Gladstone Gallery

Announcement Coincides with the Artist's Centennial to Be Celebrated with a Major Exhibition at the Tacoma Art Museum this Year

Gladstone announces global representation of The Robert Colescott Estate, the bold, satirical painter dedicated to revealing the complexities, contradictions and shortfalls of American social political history. The announcement coincides with the artist's centennial this year, marked by a major solo exhibition at the Tacoma Art Museum opening this December. A solo exhibition at Gladstone is planned for 2026 in New York, reflecting the gallery's ongoing stewardship of the legacies of pivotal historical artists.

Robert Colescott's (b. 1925, Oakland, CA; d. 2009, Tucson, AZ) nearly six-decade career included his landmark solo exhibition at the 47th Venice Biennale in 1997, where he was the first Black artist to represent the United States in a solo exhibition. He is best known for his smart, gestural, and high-keyed large-scale, chromatic canvases in which he inserted racial stereotypes into cartoon versions of famous art historical works to point to the exclusion of Black people from dominant historical narratives. Fusing high culture with vernacular traditions, including folk art, pulp fiction, and comics, Colescott offered unprecedented ways to both illustrate and combat the stereotypes that fueled racist thought. His large and varied oeuvre reflects his careerspanning search for new ideas, influences, and directions in his work. As a master of figurative painting whose work interrogates notions of identity, Colescott has been the standard-bearer for artists of color of subsequent generations to claim their rightful place in art history.

"Colescott's enlightened work is more relevant than ever during this challenging time in history," said Max Falkenstein, Gladstone's Senior Partner. "We are deeply motivated to ensure that Colescott's legacy is continually recognized, examined, and celebrated in the United States and around the world. He was truly a pioneer, and his radical vision is perfectly aligned with the artists we work with — fearless, disruptive, and instrumental in shaping the course of contemporary art."

In addition to his own artistic practice, Colescott was a long-time teacher of painting who earned the prestigious Endowed Regents' Professorship following teaching roles at institutions including the Portland State University, Oregon; The San Francisco Art Institute; University of California, Berkeley; and University of Arizona, Tucson, where he achieved emeritus status. In 1966 and 1967, he was the first visiting professor of art at the American University in Cairo. Colescott's early studies in Paris under Fernand Léger were instrumental in the artist's embrace of the human figure. Prior to studying in Paris, the artist received bachelor's and master's degrees from the University of

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California, Berkeley, under the GI Bill, following his service in the U.S. Army during World War II.

In celebration of the artist's centennial in 2025, the Tacoma Art Museum (TAM) opens The One-Two Punch: 100 Years of Robert Colescott on December 5. To further commemorate the artist, the exhibition coincides with the opening TAM's permanent space for "The Current, An Artist Award," an annual award bestowed to a Black artist living and working in Tacoma. Colescott was also the subject of a major retrospective, Art and Race Matters: The Career of Robert Colescott, which traveled to the New Museum, New York (2022); Chicago Cultural Center (2022); Sarasota Art Museum (2021); and the Portland Art Museum, Oregon (2020). The exhibition originated at the Contemporary Arts Center, Cincinnati in 2019, curated by Lowery Stokes Sims and Matthew Weseley, and was accompanied by a comprehensive monograph published by Rizzoli Electa. Colescott's first retrospective, Robert Colescott: A Retrospective, organized by the San Jose Museum of Art (San Jose, CA) in 1987, traveled to the Contemporary Arts Center, Cincinnati, OH; Baltimore Museum of Art, Baltimore, MD; Portland Art Museum, Portland, OR; Akron Art Museum, Akron, OH; Fred Jones Jr. Museum of Art, University of Oklahoma, Norman, OK; Contemporary Arts Museum, Houston, TX; New Museum, New York City, NY; and the Seattle Art Museum, Seattle, WA. Additional solo exhibitions include Robert Colescott: Women at Venus Over Manhattan Gallery in New York in 2023, and Robert Colescott: The Cairo Years at the Tahrir Cultural Center, Cairo, in 2021.

Colescott's work is represented in public collections internationally, including the Lucas Museum of Narrative Art, which acquired Colescott's iconic painting George Washington Carver Crossing the Delaware (1975), and the Jordan Schnitzer Family Foundation, following the artist's long friendship with Arlene Schnitzer, founder of Fountain Gallery (Portland), the first gallery to represent Colescott.
