## USING THE SOCIAL THINKING METHODOLOGY THE FIRST 6 WEEKS OF SCHOOL


A quick guide to teaching the thinking behind the doing

 **USE VISUAL SUPPORTS**  
Props like thought bubbles/ talking bubbles help to make abstract concepts concrete

 **TALK ABOUT THE “GROUP PLAN” INSTEAD OF “SCHEDULE”**  
This reminds students they are part of a bigger whole and gives content for expectations

 **CALL ON/DISMISS STUDENTS NONVERBALLY BY “THINKING WITH YOUR EYES”**  
This helps students to practice observing and using their eyes to gather information.

 **WHEN SETTING EXPECTATIONS: SITUATION + PEOPLE**  
Have students observe and discuss. What are the hidden rules, given the specific situation and people involved?

 **USE VOCAB TO TEACH NOT SCOLD/REDIRECT**  
Aim for a 4:1 ratio:  
4 expected behaviors for every  
1 unexpected behavior

- Step 3: Laminate

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
