

Forests Canada Recognizes Algoma's Guy Smith for Dedication to Forest Education

Barrie, Ont. (March 11, 2025) – As Canadians face the growing threat of extreme weather events, high-intensity forest fires, and biodiversity loss, <u>Forests Canada</u> hosted <u>The Forest Conference</u> on February 19 and 20 in Mississauga, Ontario to bring experts from different fields together to talk about how we can conserve, restore, and grow Canada's forests. During the conference, Forests Canada announced its annual award winners, including Algoma's Guy Smith, who received the Maple Leaves Forever Ontario Envirothon Award.

The award recognized Smith for having demonstrated exceptional leadership, involvement, and dedication to the Ontario Envirothon, a unique, environmentally-themed, annual academic competition that immerses students in hands-on learning and discovery. Through Ontario Envirothon, Forests Canada and volunteers like Smith offer budding environmental leaders a chance to explore education and career paths in the natural sciences and network with potential mentors.

Smith holds a Bachelor of Science in Forestry from the University of Toronto. After 36 years of employment with the Canadian Forestry Service in many different roles, he retired in 2023 but has maintained his involvement with the Ontario Envirothon program for over 30 years and counting. Since co-founding Algoma Envirothon in 1994, Guy's guidance and support have enabled students to compete confidently, work effectively as a team, and develop a deeper understanding of the natural world through hands-on outdoor education.

"When I look back on those years, I see teams of young people, their energy for outdoor learning, and their potential to shape the future of natural resources management and nature conservation," Smith says.

The forested beauty of the Algoma area offers natural assets for an incomparable Envirothon experience. Sites abound for outdoor learning in the core Envirothon program areas of forests, soils, aquatics, and wildlife. Each year, some 50 area students and their teachers participate in activity days, culminating in a spring competition at Stokely Creek Lodge in Goulais River. At the end of the Ontario Envirothon, teams of students put their hard-earned knowledge to the test for the chance to represent Ontario in the NCF-Envirothon against top teams from Canada and the United States.

"Volunteers contribute their time and expertise to deliver and enrich the Envirothon experience," Allison Hands, Education Manager, Forests Canada, says. "As Algoma Envirothon turns 30, this is the perfect time to recognize Guy with this award. He has been invaluable to Ontario Envirothon and has helped countless students develop critical thinking, problem solving, teamwork, leadership, and communication skills."
