CHEM 19000 - Organic Chemistry in the Lab and the Field

Pre-College Summer Course - Session 1

Course Description:

This course is designed to provide students with a unique and hands-on experience that combines ecology, ethnobotany, and organic chemistry, via an exploration of medicinal plants. Students will have the opportunity to visit Schulenberg Prairie at the Morton Arboretum to explore indigenous and folkloric medicinal plants, identify their medicinal properties, and then delve into the organic chemical structures that make these plants effective. Students will also learn organic laboratory techniques and the course will culminate in a lab component where students will utilize the knowledge gained to create their own herbal salve. The course will provide an introduction to the chemical basis of medicinal plants along with the significance of ecological restoration and sustainability in traditional medicinal plant harvesting and utilization.

In addition to lectures, discussions, and labs, class time will also be used for such lectures and visits to the Schulenberg Prairie and an observation workshop at the Smart Museum of Art. Course assignments will include videos, readings, class discussions, field/reflection journal, lab report, a final paper & a presentation.

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Learning Goals:

By the end of this course, students will be able to:

- 1. Recognize organic chemistry functional groups.
- 2. Discuss the healing properties and indigenous uses of medicinal plants.
- 3. Identify the organic functional groups besent in molecules.
- 4. Record observations in both the keld and the laboratory.
- 5. Employ organic chemistry lab party techniques.
- 6. Create a medicinal herbal bold.

Late Work: To allow for flexibility as you manage your own academic and personal commitments, two noquestions-asked, 48-hour extensions are granted for any type of assessment in this class *except the in-class Poll Everywhere questions, and the final paper and presentation*. Labs:

Students will research the medicinal properties of a number of different plants and then determine which plants will be used to make their own medicinal herbal balm.

Lab activities will consist of the preparation you do before attending lab, the activities you take part in and the observations you collect during lab, and the analysis and conclusions you draw after lab.

- *Prelab:* To prepare for lab, you will review the posted Lab Manual and complete write-up.
- *Written Observations:* During lab, you will record written observations. You will use these notes to write up your Laboratory Report.
- *Conclusions Report*: After lab, report on your lab conclusions via a written report.
