Securities Regulation is said to be among the toughest courses in law and business schools. This is not surprising. Its vocabulary is arcane and clubbish, its guiding principles nuanced and contradictory, its structure convoluted and layered. Like an M.C. Escher print, the subject flashes back and forth between esoteric and prosaic.

But if you pass through its Byzantine gates, you'll discover that studying Securities Regulation offers many rewards: solving the anagram of statutory definitions and substantive prohibitions; contemplating the majesty of the judge-made law of securities fraud; and comparing public and private securities enforcement.
