International, Transnational, and Comparative Law. incorporates many of the contexts in which legal practitioners today may encounter domestic, foreign, international, and transnational laws, rules, regulations, and customs that govern cross-border transactions. It references and includes information about the laws in many countries around the world using additional, different types of sources than are usually used in legal casebooks, in particular, sources generated by the United States government. This casebook includes a robust selection of U.S. Supreme Court cases on law that governs business transactions and lower court cases if there are no Supreme Court cases. Internal citations and unofficial reporter citations have been omitted from cited cases and publications. Excerpts from treaties and agreements have been included to familiarize students with the structure, format, and style of primary documents.

Chapter Structure:

- **A. Introduction**: The introduction of each chapter establishes a context for the Issues and Examples, Global Developments, Questions, Comments, and Resources that follow.
- **B. Summaries**: The summaries section of each chapter provides a brief overview of each of the readings in that chapter.
- **C. Issues and Examples**: Excerpts in this section include, *e.g.*, U.S. statutes, treaties, and multi- and bi-lateral trade agreements.
- **D. Global Developments**: This section of each chapter is focused on real-life developments reported in the U.S. Library of Congress's GLOBAL LEGAL MONITOR as well as other sources.
- **E.** Questions, Comments, and Resources: The questions follow up on the chapter's readings and offer students opportunities to engage in research outside the bounds of the casebook and to actively engage with laws around the world. Additional resources and readings for each topic are included at the end of each chapter. Varying types of sources are included.
