The constant quest to "remain" ahead of the technology curve is futile, as new computers, smartphones, and other devices are replaced with faster, newer versions as soon as they come off the assembly line. It is the same situation with regard to cybercrime. Once law enforcement has become proficient in investigating and tracking a certain type of cybercrime offender, new methods of offending and victimization emerge, leaving the criminal justice system to reeducate and retrain officers.

The purpose of this book is to provide the reader a thorough examination of the prominence of cybercrime in our society, as well as the criminal justice system experience with cybercrime. Research from scholars in the academic field, as well as government studies, statutes, and other material, were gathered and summarized. Key concepts, statistics, and legislative histories are discussed in every chapter. It is the desire of the author to educate and enlighten a wide audience, from those who are completely unfamiliar with the topic as an entirety to individuals who need more specific information on a particular type of cybercrime. This text should be a useful guide to students, academics, and practitioners alike.

This new edition provides a review of contemporary issues more prevalant on the cybercrime scene. The invasive and demeaning repercussions of nonconsensual pornography in relationships, as well as the link between sexting and victimization via nonconsensual pornography will be examined. The pervasive dark web, updated financial scams, and destruction by malware are also explored.
