TELUS Friendly Future Foundation is committed to helping youth reach their full potential. Fuelled by a belief that youth from underserved communities should be given equal opportunities, we support local, grassroots charities across Canada that empower youth to thrive through their innovative health and education programs.

In 2023, with the support of our donors and partners and in collaboration with the 13 Canadian TELUS Community Boards, we provided more than \$9M in grants, supporting 550 charitable projects. We prioritized local, grassroots charities, enabling them to scale their projects and drive better outcomes for youth.

We also introduced the new \$50M TELUS Student Bursary Fund, the largest national student bursary fund in Canada. Through a generous \$25M endowment gift from TELUS and a commitment from our Foundation to raise an additional \$25M, our new TELUS Student Bursary program has already awarded close to \$2M in bursaries in 2023 to more than 400 post-secondary students facing financial barriers. Our Bursary recipients are not only driven to advance their education, they're also committed to working on projects that contribute to positive health, social or environmental outcomes in their communities and around the world.

We remain committed to advancing our impact, sharing the outcomes of our grants and effectively stewarding the funds our donors entrust to us. Looking ahead, our grants will continue to support registered charities and their programs that improve outcomes for youth, while the TELUS Student Bursary program will empower even more changemakers of tomorrow.

Thank you for being with us on this inspiring journey. Our work is made possible through the generosity of our Founding Donor, TELUS, and a growing community of dedicated corporate partners, donors and volunteers, including TELUS team members, retirees and customers. 
Our 2023 impact by the numbers

By supporting a range of projects from mental health services, to mentorship, to education and climate action initiatives, we're making sure all youth have an equal opportunity to reach their full potential.


In 2023, we celebrated the 5th anniversary of TELUS Friendly Future Foundation and we're proud to celebrate the impact we've made together. With \$47M granted to 2,700 charitable projects since our inception in 2018, we've touched the lives of 2 million youth each year, creating a ripple effect that extends beyond the youth themselves to their families and communities. Not only have we helped create positive outcomes for youth today, we've also set the stage for their future well-being.

TELUS Friendly Future Foundation provided **\$11M in funding** to support 550 charitable programs and more than 400 student bursaries in 2023.

TELUS Community Board grants

We give where we live

The local, diverse leaders comprising 13 TELUS Community Boards make funding decisions that align with the acute needs of youth in their communities. This funding model, unique to TELUS, brings together passionate business and community leaders alongside TELUS leaders to ensure that TELUS Friendly Future Foundation maximizes its positive impact nationwide.

TELUS Friendly Future Foundation disburses Community Board funding (grants up to \$20,000), which can be transformational for the many local, grassroots charities we support. In 2023, we awarded funding to over 50% of the charities that applied, providing a total of 470 Community Board grants and more than \$6 million in support across Canada. Together, with the generosity of our community, we're helping youth build skills, gain confidence and feel a sense of belonging, creating a friendlier future for all.

Expanding our impact

Keeping true to our spirit of giving where we live, in 2023, TELUS Community Boards continued to expand their geographical reach across Canada to help support more communities, charities and youth. Building on our 2022 expansions in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and British Columbia, in 2023, we provided even more charities across Alberta and Ontario with opportunities to apply for funding.

2023 Community Board expansions

- To support youth in Southern Alberta, TELUS introduced the newly expanded Calgary and Southern Alberta Community Board, reaching an additional 2.5 million youth in the region.
- Growing our commitment to supporting youth in Alberta's northern communities, the renamed TELUS Edmonton and Northern Alberta Community Board expanded its reach to meet the needs of 82 additional communities encompassing an additional 260 child and youth-serving organizations that will now have the opportunity to apply for a Community Board grant.
- Expanding its impact to reach an additional 222,000 youth across Hamilton, the renamed TELUS Greater Toronto and Hamilton Area Community Board now serves the health and education needs of youth living in both metropolitan areas.
- Extending its support to youth in 11 new communities, the expanded TELUS Ottawa and Eastern Ontario Community Board has grown to support young people across the region, including in Prescott and Russell, Dundas, Prince Edward County and Hastings County.
- Increasing its scope in central Ontario, the expanded TELUS Barrie and Central Ontario Community Board has grown to support youth across the region in an additional 45 communities, including Muskoka, Grey Bruce, Dufferin, Peterborough, Kawartha Lakes and Haliburton.

TELUS Student Bursary program

Helping more students pursue their dreams

Post-secondary education opens doors to a friendlier future for youth and their families. Unfortunately, for too many youth in Canada, college or university is also a time marked by financial stress, with the average undergraduate leaving postsecondary school heavily in debt. This is even more likely for youth experiencing financial need who face additional barriers to pursuing or finishing their post-secondary education.

In 2023, TELUS Friendly Future Foundation awarded 400+ TELUS Student Bursaries totalling close to \$2M in financial relief.

Investing in tomorrow's leaders, today

In 2023, we launched the TELUS Student Bursary Fund – the largest bursary fund in Canada. It was created through a \$25M endowment gift from our founding donor, TELUS, plus an additional \$25M fundraising commitment from TELUS Friendly Future Foundation. TELUS Student Bursaries are valued at \$3,000 (college) or \$5,000 (university) to put toward tuition fees at Canadian post-secondary institutions. By providing financial assistance to deserving students across the country who are committed to giving back to their local communities, we're opening doors to a brighter future for Canada's youth.

Wrap-around services – setting students up for success

We know it takes more than education to be successful. Additional support offered to TELUS Student Bursary recipients helps ensure that these future leaders are supported in more ways than one.

In order to further relieve the financial burden of pursuing post-secondary education and keep them connected and thriving at school, Bursary recipients are eligible for TELUS' Mobility for Good and Internet for Good programs, providing them with access to free mobility and low-cost Internet plans. In 2024, we're introducing additional wrap-around services including: networking and career development opportunities, and hands-on volunteer engagement through our TELUS Wise program and an extensive network of charity partners. We're proud to launch the TELUS Student Bursary program alongside bursary recipients, post-secondary institution partners, government officials, Foundation supporters and TELUS team members (October 2023).

"As someone who grew up in the foster care system, it's been really hard to pursue my dream of going to university. I've learned – and seen through my own experience - that only eight out of every 1,000 Canadian kids in foster care will graduate with any kind of post-secondary degree. I truly believe that with the support from TELUS and TELUS Friendly Future Foundation, I will not only have the resources to graduate, but will also be able to improve those odds for other kids in the future as I hope to work on redeveloping the child welfare system."

Fueling innovation through new ways of thinking

Examples of programs that received an Innovation Grant in 2023

Solutions to many of the most pressing social and environmental challenges we face today require new ways of thinking. Launched in 2022, Innovation Grants provide multiyear funding for 'moonshot' ideas that can help charities create breakthrough changes for youth in their communities.

Living Lakes Canada

Living Lakes Canada collaborates with Indigenous and non-Indigenous communities, academia and environmental professionals to support intergenerational knowledge transfer and sharing. The Innovation Grant they recieved, enabled the organization to create a **Centre for Water Excellence** for youth across B.C. to actively learn about and engage in water stewardship. By promoting water literacy through educational programs and explorations into emerging technologies in the field, this initiative is designed to build capacity and prepare youth for careers in the environmental sector and growing green economy. Projects that received an Innovation Grant in 2023 focused on two areas: youth mental health and environmental education or climate action. We're grateful to Desjardins Foundation for partnering with us to co-fund projects focused on youth environmental education.

By the end of 2023, we committed more than **\$4.2 million in multi**year Innovation Grants to 26 youth charities across Canada. Click here to learn more about the impact of our Innovation Grants.

Fueling innovation through new ways of thinking

Fondation CHU Sainte-Justine

Traumatic brain injury and concussion (TBIC) is a leading cause of disability in children. **Fondation CHU Sainte-Justine** in Québec received an Innovation Grant to develop and test cutting-edge non-pharmacological treatments such as immersive and engaging virtual reality and video game experiences that help build everyday skills used to self-regulate thoughts, feelings and actions. Ultimately, the project – under the leadership of Dr. Miriam Beauchamp, world-renowned Canada Research Chair in Pediatric Traumatic Brain Injury – aims to ensure that every child living with TBIC can make a successful recovery, stay on track and reach their full potential.

Innovation Challenge – Livable Communities for our Youth

Since the onset of the pandemic, youth-serving charities have experienced a heightened demand from young people looking to access their programs and services. With this in mind, we launched our first Innovation Challenge on the HeroX.com platform in 2023 to connect the dots between social entrepreneurs with big ideas and charities with the drive to bring them to life. The **Livable Communities for our Youth Innovation Challenge** offered up to \$1M in funding to support partnerships between innovators, entrepreneurs or academia and Canadian charities that address pressing social challenges facing youth as it pertains to mental health, homelessness, and barriers to education and employment.

Our Innovation Challenge received an overwhelming response. There were more than 27,000 unique visitors to our Innovation Challenge page with 147 submissions within six weeks. Over 100 entries met the criteria, and 16 outstanding proposals were shortlisted. Our judging committee, composed of Foundation Board Members, were inspired by the creativity, innovation, boldness, and vision displayed by those who applied. From the shortlist, the top five submissions were selected for pitch presentations and Q&A.



Fueling innovation through new ways of thinking

Innovation Challenge – enabling MoneyPrep to build financial literacy for a friendlier future

We're excited to announce the winner of our Innovation Challenge was **MoneyPrep**, an Albertabased start-up on a mission to teach young kids around the world about money through the power of play. Their toolkit of digital, interactive money learning games engage elementary school students in financial literacy covering topics including counting, spending, saving, earning and planning habits.

By way of our Innovation Challenge, MoneyPrep is working to reach young people, especially those from traditionally marginalized communities who are at greater risk of experiencing barriers to education and employment. In 2023, we funded a successful pilot that reached more than 700 students in Alberta, with positive feedback from both the young users and parents. They're now building a partnership with non-profit partners to scale their reach to many more young people across the country. Ultimately, MoneyPrep hopes to empower kids earlier in life, by instilling a "think ahead" mindset and helping them achieve power over their financial futures, regardless of current life and family circumstances.

Fundraising for a friendlier future

Friendly Future Online Auction

In 2023, we hosted our third annual Friendly Future Online Auction in support of local charities promoting youth mental health and well-being.
