### AWAKENING THE MIRACULOUS: THE POWER OF GOD'S WORD

The Word of God contains the power of God—a profound and true statement! When we speak God's Word into our lives, we activate His power in our circumstances. Whether you're feeling stressed, sick, financially burdened, or heartbroken, the Bible holds promises that speak directly to our needs:

For stress: Isaiah 54:17 assures us, "No weapon that is formed against thee shall prosper," while Isaiah 41:10 reminds us not to fear because God is with us.

For sickness: Psalm 41:3 says, "The Lord sustains them on their sickbed and restores them from their bed of illness."

For financial struggles: Philippians 4:19 promises, "And my God will meet all your needs according to the riches of his glory in Christ Jesus."

For the brokenhearted: Psalm 34:18 declares, "The Lord is close to the brokenhearted and saves those who are crushed in spirit."

The Apostle Paul emphasizes this power when he writes, "Our gospel comes not unto you in word only, but also in power, and in the Holy Ghost."

Central to God's Word is the small yet profound word "if." Found 1,637 times throughout the Bible, "if" introduces conditions to God's promises. It reminds us that many of God's blessings depend on our responses and obedience to Him. As Deuteronomy 11:26-28 explains, blessings follow when we listen to and obey God's commandments, while curses come from turning away from His ways.

Jesus Himself frequently used "if" to highlight humanity's responsibility: "If man does, then God will." Sadly, many place the "if" on God, saying, "If God does this, then I will believe." But the Bible shows that the activation of God's power begins with us.

The miraculous is all around us because we are continually surrounded by God's omnipotence, omniscience, and omnipresence. Yet the question remains: how do we awaken and tap into this divine power? The answer lies in fulfilling the conditions set forth in God's Word.

Hear, Listen, and Obey: Deuteronomy 11:26-28 urges us to listen to and obey God's commandments to receive blessings. Obedience is key to activating His power in our lives.

Believe and Have Faith: Faith is another essential condition. In Matthew 9:20-22, a woman suffering for twelve years was healed simply by touching Jesus' garment, believing she would be made whole. Her faith activated God's power.

Perfection is Not Required: God doesn't demand perfection—only genuine faith and praise. Mark 9:23-24 tells the story of a father asking Jesus for healing, saying, "Lord, I believe; help thou mine unbelief." Jesus responded to the faith he had, not the faith he lacked.

Consider the real-life testimony of a young man, who sought God with all his heart. Struggling with questions about God's nature, he removed himself to a solitary place and dedicated three days to fasting and prayer. His earnest

## A CALL TO ACTION

In the Gospel of Matthew chapter 9 verses 35-38, we find a profound moment where Jesus makes a prayer request that is still relevant for the Church today. This prayer is not for His personal needs or desires but is a call to action for all disciples and believers who follow after Him. In this passage, Jesus looks at the multitude of people who were lost and He prays for more laborers to go out into the harvest field. This request reveals not only His compassion for humanity but also His strategy for reaching them. More laborers, more harvest!

As Jesus traveled through various towns and villages, He saw how the people were harassed, helpless, and like sheep without a shepherd. Jesus' heart broke for them, and He responded with compassion. This moment of compassion was not merely an emotional reaction; it was a recognition of the deep spiritual need of humanity. People who were wandering aimlessly, their lives marked by brokenness, confusion, and despair needed to experience salvation. Jesus saw this vast harvest and He turns to His disciples and offers this prayer request in Matthew 9:37-38: "The harvest is plentiful, but the laborers are few. Ask the Lord of the harvest, therefore, to send out workers into His harvest field.

In this request, we find three key points that are worth considering:

1. **The Harvest is Plentiful:** Jesus acknowledges that there are countless people in the world who are spiritually lost and in need of salvation.
2. **The Laborers Are Few:** Jesus points out the scarcity of workers to bring in the harvest.
3. **The Need for Prayer:** Jesus encourages His disciples to "ask the Lord of the harvest."

It is a humble recognition that only God can call and equip the workers needed for His Kingdom. Evangelism and ministry are not just human endeavors, but they require divine empowerment. The prayer request made by Jesus was not just an observation—it was a challenge. It was a direct call for His followers to see the world through His eyes and to recognize the urgent need for action. In fact,

right after making this request, Jesus sends His disciples into the field in Matthew 10. This connects the prayer request directly to the practical reality of ministry. Jesus is not merely asking for more workers; He is empowering His followers to become those workers.

Though spoken nearly 2,000 years ago, Jesus' prayer request still resonates today. The world is full of people who are spiritually lost, broken, and in desperate need of hope. The harvest is plentiful, but the laborers

remain few. There is still a desperate need for people to respond to the call of Jesus to be workers in His harvest field.

As disciples of Jesus Christ, we are called to take this request seriously. It is a reminder that the mission of the Church is far from over. Just as Jesus prayed for more laborers, we too must pray for the workers, while also considering our own role in this mission. The harvest is waiting, and the call to action is urgent. The task is immense, and the need is great. "Ask the Lord of the harvest, therefore, to send out workers into His harvest field."

## IN MEMORIAM: REV. CAMERON PRICE

Cameron Price, 54, went home to be with his Lord and Savior, Friday, April 25, 2025, surrounded by family at his home in Mars Hill, Maine. He was born September 21, 1970, in Fredericton, NB, Canada, the son of William B. and Geraldine M. (Lyons) Price.

Cameron grew up in McNamee and graduated from Upper Miramichi Regional High School in 1988. He then graduated from United Pentecostal Bible Institute in 1991. He ministered in McNamee (his home church), Nova Scotia and Moncton during his Bible school years. In 1994, he married Stacey Mullen, and they would share over thirty years of marriage together. After marriage, they went on to be the minister in Mars Hill. His ministries included music, youth, writing and directing dramas, Bible quizzing, and Sunday School.

After being encouraged to enter full-time ministry, he obtained his minister's license with the UPCI in 1998 and moved to Madawaska to become the youth pastor. He later became the assistant pastor and served on the church board. In 2002, he became the assistant pastor at the church in Millinocket. In 2004, he went back to Madawaska to be the assistant pastor, and in 2008, Cameron became the pastor at Christian Life Fellowship in Madawaska. Then in 2012, he became pastor of the Apostolic Pentecostal Church of Mars Hill, where he remained until his passing. In 2018, he briefly ministered in Soldotna, Alaska.

Cameron was a teacher, an amateur cook, a globetrotter, and a family man. He loved music and trying new foods. For 17 years, he had a "wacky barbecue" where he and a close friend barbecued exotic foods. He also enjoyed playing ice hockey and playing board/card games. He loved coffee and chocolate. He was a gifted teacher and taught classes at the Northeast Christian College for 12 years, as well as Harvest Bible College in Scotland for 15 years. He loved to play drums, sing, and study the Bible. He was actively pursuing his master's degree in theology at Urshan Graduate School of Theology. Most important to him was God, spending time with family, and making



memories. Cameron and Stacey have also opened their home and hearts to over thirty children through the years, providing a loving and safe environment for them to grow in.

In addition to his father William (Slim) Price and his step-mother, Sandra of Taxis River, NB, Canada, he is survived by his loving wife, Stacey Price of Mars Hill, fourteen children, Melissa Scott of Presque Isle, Casandra Crouse and her husband Keith of New Sweden, Morgan Price, Chyanne Price, Mayan Pratt and her partner Colby Novak, Zachary Price, Steven Price of Van Buren, Braden Scott, Charly Price, Dominique Hartley, Sophie Scott, Bentley Pelletier, Elisha Scott, Liam Delong of Massachusetts, and three grandchildren, Kaytlin and Henry Crouse, and Ian Scott. ## CONVENIENCE OR COMMITMENT

The continual pounding on the front door pulled me from the depths of sleep and I surfaced to reality. Someone was frantically knocking. A quick glance at the bedside clock revealed that it was only two o'clock in the morning. Fear tightened its grip on me until I could hardly catch my breath. My husband hastily descended the stairs to face whoever was on the other side of that door.

As I lay paralyzed with fear, I strained to hear the conversation. I realized our caller was inebriated, judging from his slurred speech. Noah gave him a warm welcome and invited him into our home. How I wished he would have just sent him on his way and hurried back to bed.

Listening intently, only bits and pieces of their conversation could be heard. Our "guest of honor" was very disturbed, and I could occasionally hear his sobs. Admittedly, I did not feel compassion. Much later, an exhausted husband returned to bed, yet it was quite some time before sleep finally overtook him.

Months later as I stood in line behind our guest at the grocery store, he turned to me and said, "Your husband saved my life. I had planned to kill myself the night I stopped by your house, but after talking with Noah, I realized that I had something to live for!"

Reflecting on that experience, I realized that: ***convenience and commitment rarely co-exist***. Had my husband shared my desire for convenience rather than being committed to live the life of Christ here on earth, this story could never have been told.

Mary was chosen to bring Jesus into the world. It was a disgrace to be unmarried and pregnant. According to the law, she could be stoned to death. When she made her commitment to the angel of the Lord, she was giving up her reputation and dreams. She wasn't guaranteed that Joseph would understand. Yet she said, "be it unto me according to thy word." (Luke 1:38)



When Jesus encountered Simon Peter, he had just returned from an unsuccessful fishing trip. He was understandably tired and discouraged. All night he had fished but only had empty nets. As Jesus came by, Simon Peter was washing his nets. Jesus entered his ship and asked him to push away from the shore. There Jesus sat and taught the people. I'm sure Peter was anxious to get home and get some rest. However, when Jesus concluded his teaching, "he said unto Simon, launch out into the deep, and let down your nets for a draught." (Luke 5:4) Peter began to explain how he had toiled all night and caught nothing. He concluded with, "nevertheless at thy word I will let down the net." (Luke 5:5) Peter respected the Master, and surrendered convenience for commitment. He was rewarded with his nets overflowing with fish!

It wasn't convenient for Jesus to go to Gethsemane. He struggled alone in the garden "saying, Father, if thou be willing, remove this cup from me: nevertheless, not my will, but thine, be done." (Luke 22:42) Neither was it convenient to be betrayed by a friend, nor to be condemned to death because of false witnesses. Jesus never succumbed to convenience. He had a commitment that was far more valuable to him than any convenience that was proposed.

I heard the knocking again. This time it is a gentle knocking on my heart's door. The voice is clear as He says, "if any man hears my voice and open the door, I will come in to him and will sup with him, and he with me." (Revelations 3:20) As we commune, His word comes to me that if I want to follow Christ, I must deny myself and take up the cross. (Luke 9:23) He teaches me how to do that, not only by His word, but also by example. In Matthew 5:44, it is clear that I must love my enemy, bless them that curse me, do good to them that hate me, and pray for them which despitefully use me and persecute me. It is not a convenient life, but when I am yoked with Jesus, He is the one that supplies the power to stay committed.
