






May Outing - Back To The Wall, Dry Falls, and Lake Lenice Trip

In spite of some fear of wind, we had a decent day on the bigger lake at Back to the Wall. The wind was whipping early but settled down nicely a little later. Not a stellar bite, but we most all caught 10 or 12 nice rainbows up to 23 inches. We fished the larger lake which is better protected from the wind. This lake is known for greater numbers but smaller fish, if you call 23 inches small. The average was about 18. Most fish were caught on hare's ear or pheasant tail nymphs or the old standard wooly bugger. Very little chironomid or dry fly action. Darc wanted to know how the small, big fish, lake was fishing so Denny and JB moved over there in the afternoon. First cast I had a fish on the San Juan worm but then it slowed down. About all we could do on the small lake was chironomid fish as the weeds were plentiful, and 90% of the takes were on the San Juan worm. The bite came on at this lake about 5pm and we could not keep them off for about 2 hours. No monsters, but I think Denny had a 22 incher. All in all, a decent day. A few of us fished Rocky Ford on Sunday. There was some surface feeding happening and I finally got a big boy to take a #20 Griffins Gnat, but didn't land him. *– John Bissett*



June Outing – Douglas Lake, BC: This year's outing to Douglas Lake was cancelled, due to an extreme fish kill occurring at the lake.

OFF Members Fishing Reports

Two local lakes each within a 1-hour drive of Lynnwood are producing well right now. Lake Sixteen south of Mount Vernon and Chain Lake near Monroe are good bets for fish in the 9-14" range with Chain Lake providing slightly longer fish. At Chain, I released 17 fish in a little over 2 hours using an olive damsel. At Sixteen, my friend using two rods released 48 fish in 5 hours using olive, green and brown body flies. Nymphs fishermen easily out produced chironomids fishermen. Advise to members who may want to check out these lakes - fish during overcast conditions as the brighter the sun the slower the bite.
