



## Song for Charlie: National Fentanyl Survey – Summer 2024

### Methodology

This research was commissioned by Song for Charlie and executed by Breakwater Strategy. Interviews were conducted online from July 8 through July 21, 2024, among a nationwide sample of n=1,500 Gen Z. Our sample included N=888 Young Adults and N=612 Teens. In this report, Young Adults refers to respondents ages 18-24, while Teens refers to respondents ages 13-17. Parental consent was required for minors between the ages of 13-17 before participation in the survey.

Results from the full survey have a margin of error of plus or minus 2.5 percentage point at the 95% confidence level and larger for subgroups. Some percentages may add to more or less than 100% due to rounding. Quotas and weights were used to ensure the demographic representation among this age cohort.
