# Belong Named Best for Care Provision at HealthInvestor Awards

Belong has taken the title for Best Care Provision at this year's HealthInvestor Seniors Housing Awards.

The national award is recognition of Belong's innovative approach to care, including its pioneering village model and adoption of technology to improve outcomes for apartment tenants, as well as its response to the coronavirus pandemic and commitment to sustainable growth.

Commenting on the win, Belong's Chief Executive, Tracey Stakes, said: "Judging was based on all aspects of our organisation, from leadership and training and development opportunities to growth and potential for future expansion. To receive such an accolade is therefore a vote of confidence in our unique model and our strong platform to diversify into further locations around the UK and achieve our aim of providing

Belong stood out as giving a glimpse of the future. The focus on creating inclusive vibrant communities, drawing on international learning was excellent. Its impressive small households and best practice dementia design enhances relationships between residents, relatives and staff and it's wonderful to see that it has worked with the University of Salford to evaluate the impact of its model, providing concrete evidence for it claims.

increasing numbers of people with access to our industry-leading care."

Belong adapted its apartment services in a number of ways during the pandemic, from increasing the frequency of its daily check-in calls, to providing socially distanced activities, resource packs, takeaway services, grocery deliveries and digital services, including the launch of the Belong Active YouTube channel,

with exercise videos for older people recorded by the villages' specialist fitness instructor (Joe Wickes style).

Technology was also key to updating residents' families and friends about the well-being of their loved ones during multiple lockdowns, with the roll-out of electronic care records (Person-Centred Software) to apartment tenants enabling wellbeing notes and Covid

status to be logged following daily checkin calls. Regular communication played a vital role in ensuring tenants felt informed, both about the ever-changing Government guidance and about the status of services within Belong villages.

Residents live in a family-like environment of belonging, involvement and positive relationships. ### For this issue of Belong Life, we spoke to Lorraine Harrison, apartment tenant at Belong Wigan.

At 50, Lorraine may seem an unusually young member of the village community; she originally came to us for support with the debilitating effects of cancer. Ten years later, she's still proud to call Belong home and plays an active part in village life.

Lorraine moved to Belong Wigan a decade ago, initially moving into Elm Household. She was living with breast cancer, which had spread to her spine, so she couldn't walk unaided and her previous care provider was unable to meet her needs.

After having a tour of the village, Lorraine instantly asked if she could live there and moving in couldn't have been better for her. "I received so much support," she tells us. "And the experience coordinator made sure I was taking part in activities so that I could get to know the other residents. In fact, they all ended up adopting me as if I was their granddaughter. It was exactly what I needed during such a tough time."

Over time, Lorraine said it was easy to feel like she was simply cohabiting with others rather than living in a care facility. "It's not like a traditional care home," she said. "You don't find residents parked in front of the TV all day. They're always doing things, chatting away, having fun. Everyone interacts — it's a lovely atmosphere."

### A new home

After four years, Lorraine's condition improved, giving her more mobility. Offered an apartment, she became more independent while retaining support. Staff visit mornings and evenings, and she has a 'help' pendant for emergencies. She's also welcomed a couple of cats to her home, Toby and Timmy.

One highlight for Lorraine has been a trip to Wembley with her mum for the Rugby League Final – a treat organised by the Belong team to celebrate her increased mobility. Lorraine and her mum enjoyed a meal out, and Lorraine even had her picture taken with the former international rugby league player, Andy Gregory.

At Belong, Lorraine makes sure she has time to develop her arts and crafts skills. She's not bad at flower arranging either. Now and again, she loves to lose herself in a film, and she enjoys dining at the Bistro – Friday chippy night being her favourite.

"I have complete independence to do what I like when I like," said Lorraine. "Recently, my mum moved in with me for a bit after my brother died because she needed the company. Really, everyone looks out for each other here."

"I've made great friends, including my neighbour, Christine. She's blind but still lives independently. She's amazing. But then, most people are around here. The staff don't treat you like you're on your last legs. It's about enjoying yourself, and they'll make sure that happens."

We look forward to working with the new Senior Management Team next spring."

### International cycling competition creates a buzz




partment tenants and residents at Belong Wigan have been going for gold by travelling the world on their bikes — all from the comfort of their care village.

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# Memory Lane...

oming face-to-face with mountain lions, accidentally encroaching on a secret US spy base and regular trips to the fabulous Las Vegas – Belong at Home Newcastle-under-Lyme customers Sheila, 80, and Don Hurst, 85, have plenty of memories to share. But, getting together in the first place wasn't all that easy.

The couple first met as teenagers whilst growing up in their small village near Stoke-on-Trent. They became friends and although Don was romantically attracted to Sheila — and she to him — he felt that she was too young at the time for a relationship.

In adulthood, the pair built their own lives, separate from one another: Don trained as an engineer, before moving to London to join the army. Later, he married and had a daughter, and built a career as a policeman. Meanwhile, Sheila remained and worked in sales and retail management – possibly due to her self-professed gift of the gab. #### Meant to be

Eventually, after their respective marriages broke down, Sheila and Don finally came together and went on to enjoy 20 years of happy marriage, as they lived their new life together to the fullest. Right now, though, they're looking forward to a visit from an addition to their family: a new great-granddaughter.

s one of the co-founders of Belong, its Chief Executive, Tracey Stakes, played an instrumental role in translating the organisation's vision to revolutionise dementia care into reality – not least by ensuring it was able to fund its remarkable transformation from being an operator of traditional care homes to running vibrant, multi-million pound community villages.

Ahead of her retirement early in 2022, Belong
Life catches up with Tracey to look back on an incredible quarter century with the organisation.

## What have been the highlights of your time with Belong?

I'm incredibly proud of the Belong village model and the quality outcomes we've been able to provide for people, especially those living with dementia. It's been a phenomenal journey to go from a blank sheet of paper to seeing villages come to life as caring communities and home to hundreds of people.

Every year, we host visits from other organisations wanting to learn from our model, and most would love to be able to implement many of our approaches, but are held back by old buildings and systems.

Funding state-of-the-art villages is not straightforward and I'm pleased that I've been able to contribute to Belong's ability to re-engineer what we do by ensuring the strong finances were in place to enable our transformation programme and ongoing development.

Building partnerships with developers and other organisations has also been vital in enabling us to replicate and evolve the village model. For example, the partnership with the Feinmann Trust has enabled us to develop Belong Morris Feinmann for the Jewish community and the relationships with Medicx and Peel Holdings have been key for Birkdale and Wirral Waters respectively.



Innovation is really important to me and the one constant during my time with Belong has been change: as an organisation and also at an individual level, we are always evolving and developing, and it's certainly that feature which has kept me here for so long.

Personally, it's been hugely rewarding over the years that my experience quickly expanded far beyond the scope of finance. By their nature, new developments involve often complex property, land and legal issues, from moving footpaths (Belong Macclesfield and therefore the whole Belong project could never have got underway without this) through proving alleged electric cables didn't

exist (at the Crewe site) to removing the Greenall's Bacardi barrel and pipeline (in Warrington).

As money is needed for the vast majority of new initiatives, working in finance involves developing some level of expertise in a range of fields, including HR and marketing, and that has certainly kept things interesting.

### What have been the biggest challenges?

It's fair to say that these recent years have presented a huge amount of crisis and issues management to work through. The delays to the build programmes of the newest villages have been frustrating, but we're pleased that the launch is now in sight for Belong Chester and Birkdale is also very close to being back on site.

Without doubt though, the experience of navigating the pandemic has been the toughest of my career and incredibly harrowing at times. It's undoubtedly taken its toll on everyone in the care sector and presented unprecedented challenges.

My colleagues in Belong have inspired me daily with their response to events, which goes beyond resilience to sheer love and commitment to residents' wellbeing.

Throughout this experience, what we've held onto has been the need to balance the risks of Covid-19 with people's overall wellbeing, which has hopefully ensured our residents have continued to enjoy quality of life in Belong.



Certainly, I'm proud of the fact that the past year has not just been about Covid-19. We have continued to keep our focus on quality, building our operations team with the addition of new managers, introducing new audits, launching a new dementia skills programme, increasing our HR capacity with the addition of two recruitment officers and providing three times more one-to-one support to residents than in the previous year.

And I have to say, it's pleasing to be going out with the distinction of having been named Best for Care Provision at the recent HealthInvestor Senior Housing Awards and having retained our Investor in People Award, in spite of being assessed in the midst of a pandemic!

### What will your legacy be?

It's great to see every village and home care service in Belong rated Good or Outstanding, and it's our people who are at the heart of this.

The biggest pull for me in being at Belong has been the truly inspirational people who work here and whom I'm proud to call colleagues.

As a Senior Management Team, one of the priorities for us early in my tenure as Chief Executive, was to ensure we remunerated people above the Real Living Wage. I'm pleased that we're pushing this further from 1 January 2022, with another increase of at least 4.3%, and bringing forward the pay award which is normally due on 1 April.

While we'd always like to be able to do more, it's positive that Belong has been able to recover occupancy quickly post-Covid and has been able to pass the benefits of this on to our workforce.

Without doubt, the greatest legacy I could hope to leave would be in seeing our people continue to thrive and take Belong forward into a new, successful era, building on its past achievements.

Belong Macclesfield launched, marking a UK first as a village setting designed around the needs of the very frail, 85+ population and in particular with the aim of providing a revolutionary setting for people with dementia.

### 2017

Succeeding Nick Dykes as Belong's Chief Executive, Tracey led the next evolution in Belong village design, creating new opportunities for inclusion and diversity through new partnerships. Helping to secure £1.8million in Heritage Lottery Funding, Tracey was instrumental in developing the partnership with specialist developer, Prime, to provide the vehicle for the restoration of a grade II listed, 17th century building and its integration as a heritage gallery within Belong Newcastle-under-Lyme. Meanwhile, in Didsbury, Belong founded its first faithbased village for the Jewish community.

### 2009

The next Belong village opened in Wigan and by 2014, three more vibrant communities were established in Crewe, Atherton and Warrington. Belong at Home and Experience Days were also launched to augment village accommodation and support with outreach services for people in the wider community.

#### 2012

Tracey was invited to chair the National Care Forum's Finance Forum, a role she continued to carry out for the next five years.

### 2018

Tracey played a key role in launching Belong's first retail charity bond, which closed early due to high demand from investors and raised £35 million to help fund future village communities and enable Belong to provide its services to more people.

2020

Working with the Senior Management team, Tracey steered Belong's Covid-19 response through the fast-changing context of the pandemic, while at the same time continuing to drive Belong's development programme and strategy.

# Chester community invited to arts workshops

embers of the public are being invited to get their creative juices flowing in a series of art workshops for those living with dementia, and their loved ones.

The Meet and Make Art project is a collaboration between dementia care specialists, Belong, and Bluecoat, Liverpool's centre for contemporary arts. Starting in November at the Grosvenor Museum, participants will be afforded the opportunity to get up-close with artefacts, rich in Cheshire's history, from the museum's collections.

Artists commissioned by Bluecoat have received extensive dementia awareness training in preparation for leading participants in the use of drawing, sculpture, music and dance, helping them to bring to life their personal stories and life experiences through art. The museum's experts will also be on hand to advise on Cheshire's natural and social history, archaeology, fashion and fine art, which will be used as a source of inspiration for the workshops.

The project serves as a precursor to the Bluecoat artists taking up their art 'residencies' at Belong Chester when the highly-anticipated new care village opens on City Road, early next year.

In 2019, a successful pilot saw the artists taking up residency at Belong Crewe, engaging customers in a bespoke six-month arts programme. Academics recognised the wellbeing benefits from the initiative, which included high engagement, enhanced cognitive capacity and an increased sense of community amongst participants.

Stacey McCann, chief operating officer for Belong, commented: "We've already seen the benefits of using arts in our care villages to improve the lives of older people and those living with dementia. The outcomes of the upcoming workshops will influence the artists' residencies at our Belong Chester care village when it opens in 2022, so we're looking forward to seeing the results."

Tabitha Moses, project facilitator for Bluecoat, added: "The Meet and Make Art project is unique in that it has been designed for both the person living with dementia and a loved one to enjoy equally, no matter their ability.

It's about using art to explore creativity, as well as making connections with others. Places are free but limited, so we advise those interested to get in touch as soon as



# Living the Values



We speak to colleagues who embody Belong's values in their day-to-day work.

ane initially joined the Belong group back in 2008, in the days when it still owned its more traditional CLS care homes, working at one of its locations in Winsford for a number of years before resolving to pursue a nursing degree. She returned to Belong as a nurse in 2019, and describes how she has been supported to grow her career and the fulfilment earned from nursing in a care environment.

### Can you tell us about your background?

When I joined CLS as a care assistant, I'd just completed a degree in Psychology and Criminology and didn't know where I wanted my career to go. Luckily, I fell in love with care straight away and so I stayed and worked toward becoming a senior care assistant then, later, care team leader.

In 2015, I applied to do a degree in nursing. It felt like a natural progression from caring, and I was keen to learn more. I remained working part-time, and on one of my placements I popped into Belong Warrington to shadow a nurse there. When I qualified, I worked in hospitals for 18 months before returning to care.

### What does your job involve?

I came back into care because I missed the closeness and the relationships I was able to build with customers. The hospital was great, but you're helping people get better and then you never see them again. When looking after those in social care environments, you work with people to support their physical health needs, as well as their social and psychological wellbeing, on a longer-term



basis and so you develop relationships with them. That's what I enjoy the most.

Day-to-day, I lead my nurse team, coaching and training them so they can develop their own careers. There is also quite a bit of networking with GPs and nurse practitioners, so there's lots of opportunity to learn new skills as well.

### What would you say the most important parts are?

I love the village set-up of Belong and I wouldn't have worked anywhere else. It feels like a 'home from home', a real community.

My job, and nursing, in particular, has given me the opportunity to progress. My current role gives me the autonomy to influence and implement my own ideas, such as different ways of working – and I really appreciate that.

### And what are the most rewarding aspects of your role?

It's incredibly fulfilling and rewarding. To be able to work with and help people thrive independently, in a compassionate setting is a lovely way to spend your career. Anyone thinking of a nursing career or a job in care should definitely give it a try. Leave all those preconceptions behind – what you'll find is a completely different world to one you'd imagine.

### In the Spotlight: Emma Gorton

or this issue of Belong Life, we spoke to Emma Gorton, Belong at Home
 Community Support Worker at Belong Didsbury and Altrincham, who shares a very personal career journey story with us.

For many, experiencing the loss of a loved one can have a profound effect on our outlook on life. For Emma Gorton, 42, it was the passing of her mother following months caring for her that caused her to embark on a new direction, dedicating her working life to caring for others in Didsbury and Altrincham, as a Belong at Home community support worker.


Amid an enjoyable career as office manager for a family-run business, Emma received the devastating news that her mother had been diagnosed with terminal lung cancer. Taking a break from work, she spent the precious time left looking after her mum's needs, from managing medication and domestic tasks, to emotional support, before her mum sadly passed away.

Whilst coming to terms with her bereavement, Emma struggled to decide how to move forward with working life. She provides more detail: "It was a difficult time and I was at one of life's crossroads: I knew I didn't want to go back to the office and I'd really enjoyed being there for mum; the district nurses said I'd done a great job and caring just came naturally to me."

Still unsure about her next step, it was a chance conversation that influenced the path of Emma's career. She continues: "I was talking with a friend about my experience and she said Belong at Home had vacancies. With my background and no care qualifications, I didn't think I'd be in with a shout but she advised that professional experience isn't necessary and that they train colleagues who share their values.

"I thought, 'If I can look after people like my mum, then I'm on to a winner' and so I decided to go for it."

Joining the Belong at Home team as a community support worker, Emma now spends around 20 hours each week visiting older people in their homes in and around south Manchester. She initially trained on-the-job for The Care Certificate, designed for those who are new to care, as part of a comprehensive induction programme. Since then, she has gone on to achieve levels 2 and 3 NVQ in Health and Social Care, allowing her to progress to a senior position.



Reflecting on her career change, she says: "It didn't take me long to realise I'd made the right decision. Belong at Home really cares about its team — they're flexible with my childcare, the training is exceptional and they even pay for your time when travelling between customers, not just the time you spend caring for them and not all domiciliary care employers offer this.

"People often call us 'carers', but I prefer 'support worker' as you're supporting adults, sometimes at the start of their dementia journey, to live and enjoy their lives as independently as possible. It might be accompanying them to the shops or having a chat over tea and biscuits, these small everyday moments mean the world to them, which makes my job very rewarding."



### **Volunteer profile**

In this feature, we recognise the outstanding contributions of volunteers to the Belong community. This issue, we give our thanks to Roland Horrocks, who, for the past eight years, has been leading coffee mornings at Belong Atherton.

If you pop along to one of the village's coffee mornings, you may notice a special sign which reads: 'Welcome to Roland's award-winning coffee morning'. That's because, in 2014, Roland's contribution was recognised when he was named 'Volunteer of the Year' at Belong's colleague awards.

After being nominated by his peers, the judging panel commended Roland's work but also noted his gratitude for the positive effect volunteering at the village had on his life. He tells us more: "I'd retired from my teaching assistant job, supporting those with learning disabilities. However, without work and having people around me, I'd started suffering from depression

and so I set about looking for volunteering opportunities where I could continue helping others.

"Initially, I started off assisting with the coffee sessions — I didn't have any professional barista experience, but I do drink a lot of coffee myself, so that certainly helped!"

Every Monday and Thursday, Roland arrives early to set everything up before being joined by residents and apartment tenants for their favourite hot drink and a friendly catch-up. Allan Barnes, Ena Household resident, shares his thanks for the host: "Roland has a brilliant sense of humour and is always laughing; he is such fun to be around and nothing is ever too much trouble for him."

The mornings continue to be as popular as ever, perhaps likely due to Roland's positive outlook and compassion. He continues, "Volunteering gives me companionship and structure in my life. It's not just about pouring drinks; I feel it's my duty to be as fun-loving as possible. If you can make someone smile, then you make their day."

We couldn't agree more, Roland – we're so pleased volunteering with us has supported your wellbeing and everyone at Belong values the contribution you make.

They then enjoyed hot chocolates, kindly made by the Bistro team.








### **David finds himself at Belong Wigan**
