TEAM UPDATE

Together with our community partners, the BEP empowered youth across Waterloo Region with bold new opportunities to lead, learn, and shape their futures. This past year marked a season of change and renewal as we expanded programming, deepened youth engagement, and navigated key leadership transitions. A highlight for our team this year was being recognized for our community engagement as the recipient of the Cambridge and North Dumfries 2024 Community Collaboration Award.

We were proud to relaunch the Youth Creativity Fund, supported by a \$188,000 investment over 2.5 years. Already, 87 youth have received grants to lead community-based projects—bringing their ideas to life with funding, mentorship, and support. Our ICE Challenges offered real-world learning to 327 students, while the Speakers Bureau delivered 186 visits to 25 schools, connecting classrooms with professionals from a wide range of careers. We also piloted a new Career Coaching program, offering small group guidance to help grade 9 and 10 students. We connected with 14,500+ students this year and are excited to grow this impactful program. Launched in summer 2023, our Youth Ambassador Program continues to thrive. Through one-on-one mentorship, career development workshops, and direct feedback, we've built stronger relationships with youth and ensured their voices are central to our work. This year, we introduced a new panel series for youth and caregivers, featuring industry experts on topics from STEM and Al to Skilled Trades and Entrepreneurship. These conversations reinforced the critical role caregivers play in a young person's career journey. Building on this momentum, we are thrilled to bring back our Explore Your Future Career Expo this fall for students in Grades 7–12 and their families to connect with local employers.

We also experienced leadership transitions. A special thank you to Andrea Harding for stepping in as Interim Executive Director during my parental leave. I was proud to return to the BEP in early 2025 and am energized by what lies ahead.

We look forward to continuing our work with partners, educators, businesses, and youth to build a stronger, more connected future. The best is yet to come.

"Mostly the message of not needing to know what you want right away, and being able to pursue your dream at any point in your life. It was interesting to hear that he achieved his broadcasting career much later in life. I've felt I've known what I wanted for years, but in recent months I've been second-guessing my specific education choices or having conflict over pursing what I want or what is realistic, and it was reassuring, in some way, to hear from an adult that I still have a whole life ahead of me, where I'm able to change my mind and not need to decide my whole future at seventeen."

Volunteer speakers engage in small group career conversations with students, they share their career journey, answer student questions, and help them connect their interests to real-world opportunities. These conversations give students valuable insight into different career paths, the skills needed for success, and how learning in school connects to the working world.

Innovation, Creativity, and Entrepreneurship (ICE) Challenges help students learn about the world of work, develop skills, and grow their confidence by applying design thinking skills to problems facing local businesses and community organizations.

Over the course of the 2024–2025 school year, BEP facilitated eight sector-partnered ICE Challenge workshops, bringing together more than 325 Specialist High Skills Major (SHSM) students to solve real-world problems in industries ranging from healthcare to hospitality, construction to community planning.

Students collaborated with professionals, prototyped creative solutions, and practiced their problem solving skills—while also discovering potential career pathways.



The Youth Creativity Fund (YCF) empowers high school students across Waterloo Region to bring their ideas to life through microgrants of up to \$1,000.

This school year, YCF supported over 30 youth-led projects, including student-run events, tech innovations, small businesses, community initiatives, and content creation.

Notable projects included an intergenerational AI app to combat senior isolation, a seed bank to support food sustainability, a neuroscience research project using EEG, and a space-ready heating device launching on a NASA mission.

Through this program, students gain real-world experience in budgeting, planning, and problem-solving while addressing issues that matter to them. Many participants also received coaching, mentorship, and opportunities to showcase their work publicly.

The YCF continues to foster youth leadership, innovation, and civic engagement by investing in students as change-makers in their schools and communities. We look forward to continuing this program next school year. Since it's inception, the Youth Creativity Fund has achived the following;


DISTRIBUTED IN GRANTS

From tackling social isolation to advancing green tech, this year's Youth Creativity Fund projects reflected passion, purpose, and innovation.

Riya's Stress Buster Buddy supports student mental health through a wellness kit. Olivia's team is building an Al-powered app to connect youth with seniors, while Chloe's YouTube channel captures her coming-of-age journey. Benson's EV team is designing a high-efficiency electric car for competition, supported by engineering partners. Meron and Camryn revived Senior Tea, a community-building event bridging generations.

From personal storytelling to sustainable design, these projects show the powerful impact of youth-led ideas—driven by creativity and supported by BEP.

YOUTH AMBASSADORS

Together, they developed the Career Resource Toolkit for Students, a student-led collection of videos, blogs, and worksheets designed to help their peers explore future careers with confidence.



EXPLORE YOUR FUTURE

This year, the BEP hosted four Explore Your Future events, attracting over 480 students and caregivers to explore career paths in 2SLGBTQIA+ inclusion, entrepreneurship, the skilled trades, and STEM & AI.

Each session featured diverse panels, open Q&A, and networking opportunities to connect caregivers and youth with local professionals and real-world insights. Held in welcoming public spaces, these events supported informed career conversations and built excitement around future career possibilities.

This is our long-standing event that gives an opportunity for caregivers and students in grades 7-12 to directly speak with businesses, organizations, and local post-secondary institutions about future possibilities.



TRADES PD

Throughout the 2024/25 school year, the Business and Education Partnership hosted 3 different Trades PD Tours in our series hosting a total of 103 local educators as they toured and learned about three very different trades.

They were able to see first hand careers in the skilled trade of sheet metal, the skilled trades at the Conestoga College Reuter Skilled Trades Campus, the automotive industry at Toyota Motor Manufacturing and engineering and manufacturing at Linamar.

The Trades PD series features in-person professional development experiences and tours that educate and support local educators to better advise students about opportunities in the skilled trades and share insights into these sectors. We are pleased to partner with incredible community partners like the Sheet Metal Workers International Union, Toyota Motor Manufacturing, Conestoga College, Linamar, and the Waterloo Catholic District School Board on this amazing opportunity.

LEGACY BUILDERS

The Legacy Builders program is offered by the Grand Valley Construction Association in partnership with BEP for Grade 8 classes in Waterloo Region. The Legacy Builders Program is a fun and integrative way to learn about the vast amount of career options that exist in the construction industry.

Sessions include introduction to trades by a construction professional, personal stories about how the presenter entered their trade, the ways in which they've grown their career in the trades, and examples of different career paths one can take. Students receive swag and information sheets to take home to their families (i.e., a flow chart showing career options, estimated salaries, education required).

Students are placed into small groups and play a fun and interactive game focused on pricing a construction job with prizes for the winning team.

LIFE AFTER OYAP

Graduating OYAP is a free online Zoom session offered to all graduating WRDSB and WCDSB grade 12 Ontario Youth Apprenticeship Program (OYAP) students and their parents. We provide next steps for students by increasing awareness of various services available to graduating OYAP students in the skilled trades and the apprenticeship pathways. These events feature presentations from our partners, Starling Employment Services, Support Ontario Youth (SOY), Apprenticesearch.com. They each shared supports available to youth including:

JOB TALKS



In partnership with the WCDSB and WRDSB, the Business & Education Partnership offer a series of free online webinars promoting careers in the skilled trades. These events feature prominent keynote speaker and skilled trades expert Jon Callagher, PhD who is the Executive Director of Job Talks. Representatives from both school boards also delivered presentations about OYAP specific programming in the schools followed by an interactive Q & A.

508 families with students in grades 7-12 viewed and took part across both events, "What Caregivers Need to Know about Careers in the Skilled Trades for parents and caregivers" and "5 Great Reasons to Pursue a Career in the Skilled Trades aimed at students". Our goals are to increase awareness of the Ontario Youth Apprenticeship Program; what it is, its benefits, and how a student could get started. We also seek to increase awareness of the benefits of a career in the skilled trades, and specifically the apprenticeship pathway.

In partnership with JA Southwestern Ontario Inc., Career Hunt events bring students together with career mentors working in a variety of desired fields, industries and professions. Each student participates in interactive sessions that will open up a world of choices and help them learn first-hand what it takes to be successful. This experience clarifies career and educational pathways and students become actively engaged in designing their own career path.

These events feature:

- Career "Breakout Sessions" set up in different online rooms where students join to learn about the careers that interest them most
- Mainstage Speakers Inspirational keynotes
- Interactive chat moderated Q & A format for students to ask questions
- Career Expo Event area with additional career mentor videos to be accessed during asynchronous time

BLACK BRILLIANCE LEADERSHIP CONFERENCE

On February 24, 2024, BEP had the opportunity to participate in the Black Brilliance Leadership Conference at Elmira District Secondary School, as part of the school's Black History Month programming. Themed "Flourish," the conference created a space for local African, Caribbean, and Black-identifying (ACB) students to be celebrated, represented, and empowered.

BEP's Program Manager, Youth Innovation, Alethea Robinson, delivered the keynote address, sharing a personal and inspiring message about what it means to thrive in spaces where you're not always expected to. The day also featured student-led panels, engaging workshops facilitated by Adventure4Change, and a high-energy closing session led by Rhythm and Blues Cambridge.

WRDSB Trustee Maedith Radlein and Equity and Inclusion Officer Teneile Warren were in attendance to support the students and school staff. Special thanks go to the teachers and school leadership at Elmira District Secondary School, whose commitment to creating safe, affirming spaces made the day possible.

The Black Brilliance Conference was a powerful example of what happens when we invest in youth voice, representation, and leadership—offering a meaningful space for students to be seen, heard, and inspired to flourish.

BETTER TENT CITY SLEEP OUT

Hundreds of students from four WCDSB secondary schools came together November 2024 for the second annual sleepout as part of the Homes for Hope campaign. The sleepout offered students powerful learning experiences, fostering empathy, building awareness and raising funds for the challenges faced by those facing systematic housing inequities issues in the region.

The BEP was proud to support this incredible event by arranging the impactful kick off keynote speaker from our volunteer Speakers Bureau, Ashley Schuitema, executive director and lawyer with Waterloo Region Community Legal Services and homeless advocate. Ashley delivered a powerful keynote that opened the students eyes to the challenges of the growing number of unhoused individuals in Waterloo Region.

The ultimate goal was to inspire students to see their role in building supportive communities and is a vital effort to raise funds for the Homes for Hope campaign.







WRDSB FUNDING FAIRS

Throughout the spring, our Marketing & Communications Manager, Lauren Harvey, attended funding fairs to raise awareness of our Youth Creativity Fund program. She attended events at Grand River Collegiate Institute, Kitchener-Waterloo Collegiate Institute, Southwood Secondary School, Glenview Park Secondary School, and Preston High School.

These Funding Fairs highlighted multiple organizations across our region providing opportunities to bring youth-led initiatives to life. We want to thank Student Engagement Officer, Delia Loveless, for her hard work in bringing these together and creating this opportunity to reach and engage with more youth.

CHAMBER EXPO

In April we were able to participate in the Chamber Expo put on by the Greater Kitchener-Waterloo, Guelph, and Cambridge Chambers of Commerce. It was an incredible opportunity to connect with our community, recruit volunteers for our Speakers Bureau, and share with the business community how we are impacting the next generation of our workforce.

We are thankful to the Chambers for inviting us to this event, and to all who stopped by and shared career advice that we can pass on to our youth!

WOMEN IN STEM CAREER FAIR

The Speakers Bureau has proudly supported this exciting event run by a team of Galt Collegiate Institute students to showcase women in STEM careers and bring awareness, encourage diversity and empower young women to consider pursuing these underrepresented industries.

12 Speakers Bureau female professionals actively took part at career stations, where they shared their career stories with hundreds of students. The event showcased a wide variety of careers and sectors in science, technology, engineering and math including civil and chemical engineering, welding, construction, IT, biology, environmental science, pharmacy and finance





We are very thankful to all of our individual donors this past year! We couldn't provide the programming we do without their support. A special thank you to long time supporter and previous BEP Director, Mike Stork, for supporting our yearly matching campaign. This campaign runs each fall and matches the first \$15,000 donated to go directly to BEP programming that is helping youth build their paths to rewarding careers.

POST-SECONDARY VOLUNTEER FAIRS

This past fall, Jennifer and Lauren were able to represent the BEP at volunteers fiars hosted by Wilfred Laurier University and the University of Waterloo. It was an incredible opportunity to speak to young people and encourage them to support students coming up after them.

We believe involving more young people in our programs and events can have a large impact. Including young adults helps youth envision their future a few steps ahead and hear advice from others who understand the impacts the pandemic had on their education and thinking about the future.





WUSA CONFERENCE

This past March, we were chosen as the community partner for a leadership conference put on by Waterloo University's Student Association. For their service project, students filled out postcards with encouraging messages to be added to our Youth Creativity Fund acceptance packages! To create the postcards we involved past Youth Creativity Fund recipient, Arielle, to design them.

OK2BME GSA CONFERENCE

This year marked our second time hosting a panel at Camino's OK2BME GSA (Gay Straight Alliance) Conference.

The BEP arranged speakers for a panel titled, "Navigating Your Career Path with Confidence" through which our volunteers shared their personal experience navigating careers and how their personal journies impacted their decisions. This year we were able to set up an anonymous Q&A platform and participants were able to submit questions such as "How do you know if a workplace is genuinely accepting, or if they are just using the right buzz words in their posting?", "How have you navigated discrimination in the workplace?", and "How did you find mentors/community?"

This event is always a hightlight for us. Our team had a great time interacting with youth, connecting with other organizations, and watching our volunteers shine!





PRIORITIZING ALTERNATIVE LEARNING

This academic year, out team made it a goal to expand our outreach to new and diverse communities across Waterloo Region. Team members joined educators and social workers early in the fall to learn more about how we could better support youth involved in alternative learning programing. Our goal was to engage, connect and inspire these students and connect them with resources throughout the Region.

We are proud to say that we took part in a diverse variety of visits reaching a diverse group of students who benefitted from our Speakers Bureau visits. We are appreciative of our volunteers willingness to try something new and tailor their talks to meet the unique needs of these students.

Our goal was to send volunteers out to 10 speaking engagements, and we were able to arrange 13! We have also worked closely with educators to make the Youth Creativity Fund more accessible and approachable for these students.
