### EYFS Statutory Framework, Safeguarding and Welfare requirements:

3.2. Providers must take all necessary steps to keep children safe and well.

The requirements in this section explain what early years providers must do to: safeguard children; ensure the suitability of adults who have contact with children; promote good health; manage behaviour; and maintain records, policies and procedures.

#### Intent

The intent and purpose of this visit is to look at the quality of provision and teaching; to think about 'what is it like for a child here'; and to ascertain how children are being supported in their learning and development. This is the second visit in the first year and the childminder will have already had a compliance visit to ensure they are meeting the Safeguarding and Welfare requirements of the EYFS.

#### **Implementation**

This visit will consist of discussion with the childminder and with parents where possible, observation of early years quality practice, evidence of reflective practice and scenarios.

#### **Impact**

All of the above are to ensure compliance, support for personal and professional growth and to enable reflective practice to enable progression of the childminder's business and to embed exceptional early years practice.

#### Grading

#### **Quality of education** – [ Good ]

Emete places a sharp focus on introducing new words and increasing children's vocabulary during her interactions with them. She uses all opportunities to speak about letters, colours and mathematical concepts. As an example when they were threading beads she introduced colour patterns. Emete provides good opportunities for children to make marks to help promote their literacy skills both indoors and outside with chalk. Emete works closely with parents to find out what children can do and she offers good support to help close any gaps in their learning. Parents report that they are extremely happy with the care she provides and the progress their children make. They are particularly impressed with her communication and how she sends them home with a book to read daily and other learning material to continue learning weekly. All the children confidently explore and discover as they use the interesting activities on offer. They show sustained levels of interest, despite their young ages and within the setting there is a clear focus on promoting children's language and Ems shows a genuine interest in them and makes sure all children get appropriate one to one time with her whilst the others partake in freeplay. Emete regularly provides parents with information on children's next steps in their development alongside

providing them with ideas and guidance to support their continued learning at home. Each child has an individualised bag. Emete has adopted a curriculum that, overall, is designed to prepare children for school and further learning and she links activities to her themes e.g. they were bug hunting in the garden and then played bug bingo.

#### Personal development - [Good]

Emete promotes healthy eating and teaches them to use good table manners and how to use their cutlery properly. Menus are emailed to parents weekly and Emete is able to cater for all food requirements. Children have daily opportunities to be physical and extend their physical fitness in the garden. Promoting children's personal, social and emotional development is a clear priority. Emete gives them time to independently put on their shoes and coats. Children learn to be kind to others. They behave well and learn to respect each other. Emete provides age-appropriate opportunities for children to learn about different customs and traditions and today they were dressed up for World book day. They are often given the opportunity to taste a variety of cultural foods.

#### Behaviour and attitudes - [Good]

Children behave well. They tidy away the toys and with support, sort them into their relevant boxes. Children wash their hands with little prompting. Emete teaches children to be kind and to help each other. Children help each other find their shoes, and put on their own coats ready for outdoor play. Emete has high expectations for children's behaviour and encourages the use of good manners. The children are encouraged to share and any conflicts are dealt with immediately. Emete is very gentle and patient in her approach. She communicates to children with care and respect. They show they are resilient and gain confidence, as they practise climbing up steps on the slide and throw the frisbee.

#### **Leadership and management** – [Good]

Emete regularly reviews her practice, making improvements and adjustments. She analyses how children use the areas of her home and has recently adapted her provision. Emete completes training to keep up to date with changes in legislation and current developments. This helps her to achieve a good level of service for children and their families. Emete has just this week started a volunteer assistant and has introduced her to the parents and is beginning an induction process with her. She completes thorough two year progress checks and regular three month reviews of development with parents. She observes and has support plans to assess SEN needs and knows how to access early intervention if required.

#### Social and emotional well being - [Good]

All children make independent choices from the wide range of resources and activities on offer. They enjoy a variety of adult and child led activities and Emete introduces learning based on their interests eg putting letters on cars .The children are keen to include Emete and visitors in their play. Ems interacts with children positively; she talks to them and asks questions as they play, which helps to build on their vocabulary and understanding. Emete listens with interest. She responds to what all children have to say and this helps children to develop their speaking skills. Children, including babies, feel safe and are happy and confident in this familiar environment. They confidently explore and discover as they use the interesting activities on offer. Emete supports their emotional well-being highly effectively and immediately responds to their individual needs.

#### Overall effectiveness – What is it like for a child here?

Children, including babies, feel safe and are happy and confident in this familiar environment. They confidently explore and discover as they use the interesting activities on offer. Children show sustained levels of interest, despite their young ages. Children form close relationships with each other and have also formed close bonds with nurturing Ems. They show they feel secure in their environment and greet visitors with a smile when they enter the home. Emete regularly assesses children's learning and current level of development. She uses this information to plan for what she wants them to learn next and adapts activities to reflect children's individual abilities. The environment is calm and children are settled and relaxed. Even young children who are new to the setting, show that they feel safe. Relationships between children, and Emete are warm and friendly. This helps children to feel secure and promotes their emotional well-being.

#### Areas of strength

- Emete's patience and calm manner
- The relationship and partnership working that is carried out with parents.
- The well laid out space and range of books and toys which are rotated regularly.
- The safe, secure home from home environment that has been created.

#### Areas for further professional development

- Further develop and formalise induction process for all staff and create questions to assess their understanding.
- Ensure that assessment is used effectively to support teaching and inform future planning
- Provide children with a rich set of experiences that promote an understanding of, and respect for, people, families and communities beyond their own

#### Safeguarding

The arrangements for safeguarding are effective. Emete has a good understanding of child protection issues and the procedure to follow if a child is suffering from abuse or neglect. She helps children learn to respect their own and others' bodies and to use the toilet one at a time. Her home is safe and clean and good hygiene practices are adopted to prevent the spread of infection. Emete is also aware of how to recognise signs that children or adults may be at risk of having extreme views. She carries out regular risk assessments.
