## "She was one heck of a troop".



She was just one of those dedicated souls that backed up every one of her bosses 100 percent. This is what retired Sgt. Larry Ward said about Judy Keiper as she was retiring from working for 20 years as a secretary for the Gresham Police Department.

Born in Council Bluffs, IA, in 1939, Judy Addington graduated from Thomas Jefferson High School in 1957. She worked as a secretary for the telephone company in Council Bluffs before moving to Portland. Her first job in Portland

was as a waitress at Yaw's Top Notch restaurant. She earned her secretarial degree at Mt. Hood Community College while working as a waitress at Dunkin Donuts.

While Judy was skating at an ice rink, the PGE HR director approached her and offered her a job at PGE. After working as a secretary at PGE for almost 10 years, Judy left to work for the evangelist, Katherine Kuhlman. She traveled all over the US organizing Kuhlman's services, one of which was in Portland.

Judy then took a secretarial job at the Salvation Army Church on Sandy Blvd. She was asked to start the Gresham service center in a store front. She started many of the Salvation Army programs in Gresham, including the Christmas bell ringing and a Little People's Day Care for parents who wanted to have a couple of hours to do errands.

Next she went to work for the Portland Police Bureau and, when a job opened up, she moved to the Gresham police department in 1976. On her first night alone as a dispatcher in Gresham, a United Airlines plane crashed and she had to deal with sending out response units. In Gresham she worked her way up to administrative secretary, but her interest was in the investigation department, so she worked in that department until she retired.

Her biggest contribution as a civilian police employee was helping to start the TIPS program which stands for Traumatic Incident Peer Support. Judy chaired the team which reported to the department chaplain and helped officers involved in shootings or who lost family members. She also helped start the Explorers Post for teenagers interested in law enforcement careers.

Judy retired in 1996, and a week later married the love of her life, Vernon Keiper. She instantly became a mother and grandmother to Vern's family. After a 17 day Caribbean honeymoon cruise, Judy began working part time at a travel agency. They travelled a lot throughout their marriage, including many cruises. For about 10 years, every winter, they travelled south to Arizona as snowbirds.

In 2013 they decided to make their lives easier and moved into CherryWood Village, Orchards 4<sup>th</sup> floor until Vernon needed additional care. They then moved into Royal Anne where they lived until Vernon's death on Easter Sunday, 2018. Judy then moved to an apartment on the second floor of Orchards.

Volunteering here at CherryWood has been a priority for Judy. She has been President and Secretary of the Resident Council, Chairman and Secretary of the Dining Services Committee, Secretary for the Environment and Preparedness Committee and Chairman of the Library Committee.

WE DID IT! WE DID IT! Wow!

On Monday January 18th at approximately 9:30 a.m. the first Covid-19 for C-Hall was given to the first resident who lives in the first apartment, A nurse, named Ron, who administered the inoculation was a volunteer from another village like ours and was accompanied by our

very own Alejandra, who normally works the front desk on the weekends; she was also volunteering her time. The entire second floor received the vaccine at the same time. It was a tricky thing to pull off.

The vaccine could only be out for a total of six hours according to protocol. The first floor got their vaccine at the same time and in the same manner.

I'm not sure who was more apprehensive, our Vitality Staff people who were in charge of helping people get seated and ready, or us, the residents. The staff dressed in capes and Hero outfits. They kept helping late-comers, found space for them and got them to answer some questions. Remember the consent forms we filled out prior to the event?

Ron, the nurse, had to go over every question in that document to make certain it was the same person sitting in front of him.

I must confess, that I was as conflicted as any of us. Not knowing what to expect and then finding myself in the event for sure, I decided to not look, so I looked at the others who were already sitting in their chairs and being monitored, while the goodie bags of sweets and treats were passed out to us all.

Like all the rest of the residents who did take the vaccine, this was **not the first injection of my life, and Ron had a calm and reassuring manner and I turned my trust over to him. Then he prepared the area with antiseptic and gave me the vaccine.** Ron had me in a Bandaid before I could turn my head back to look at him. And then he went on to the next resident. The second and FINAL ONE, for those of us who took the first shot, will be in three weeks. Not all residents took advantage of the opportunity of the first dose. It is my hope that after reading this, they will reassess their reasons and go to one of the other clinics.

Yes, we will still have to wear masks for the protection of others, and once we are done with the second shot, we will still be wise to stay close to home, because there are still a lot of people out there who are still dealing negatively with the mask issue. My own son is a surgeon and he had to get the vaccine from the hospital where he does his surgeries and the hospital took on their entire staffs.

All the residents who took the vaccine are the real **TRUE HEROS**. **They are the ones who have been remaining their apartment for at best, 20+ hours a day, but as long as 23 hours a day.** If you have not received it yet, you can change your mind and sign up for the next clinic.
