IMPOSSIBLE DREAMS ACHIEVED



Bonnie & Bill Pickens

Bill and Bonnie's meeting was an impossible dream. They first met in Goose Bay, Labrador, then were engaged via military radio from Saigon to Okinawa and married in the Philippines.

Bonnie, a Minnesota farm girl, remembers their first tractor, electricity changing farming, family members off to war and buying War Bonds from sales of pigs for her college. She loved lying on the lawn reading and dreamed

the "impossible dream" of the airplanes overhead taking her to distant places. She taught senior high English, speech, and debate in Minnesota, traveling to several states during summers, and interning in Senator Humphrey's D.C. office. To satisfy the travel bug she applied to teach in the Department of Defense schools located around the world. Her first job was in Puerto Rio, then Goose Bay and Okinawa.

At an early age Bill's parents divorced; his mother and the 6 children moved to Jackson, Tennessee. During the civil rights movement, his mother taught them that we are all pink under our skin. Bill had a paper route and he learned to win at "pitching pennies" from his customer, song writer (Blue Suede Shoes) Carl Perkins. He excelled at school but at that time, college was an "impossible dream". Working as an electronics technician in the US Navy, upon discharge, Bill joined Sperry-Univac as a computer technician. He worked on military bases. First assignment was Goose Bay, then Saigon, the Philippines, Japan and Hawaii. The computers with 16 K memory were the fastest at the time. In Viet Nam they required 4 trailers to house the equipment, Bill received his college degree in Business in Hawaii.

The family moved to San Rafael, Calif. in 1977 to briefly help his sister-in-law when his older brother tragically died, they bought a home with a swimming pool which propelled them to their biggest "impossible dream!" Tired of leaves in the pool, Bill contacted the area's only automatic swimming pool cover company who basically said take it or leave it. *(continued on page 2)*

By coincidence, sensing an opportunity, Bill heard of a different manufacturer of covers wanting a dealer and the Pickens started a safety pool cover business in their spare bedroom, sharing a desk and phone. Bill did sales, installation, and service, using a beat-up van. They did home shows, visited pool services and builders and soon business flourished, making it necessary to hire and expand into a building. It became the largest independent safety automatic pool cover distributer in the US, and was recognized as a leader in the industry. Their business model: Treat employees and customers with respect and fairness. They believed those who were helping make the company successful should benefit, so using open book and participatory management, it became employee owned. The company contributed its' profits to a trust distributed as company stock to employees and upon resignation or retirement, the employee could sell his stock back to the trust and take a cash payment. The company won many awards for its ESOP and Bill and Bonnie spoke frequently at national and international conventions about their company.

In 2002, they retired in northern San Diego County and became active volunteers in the Fire District and Homeowners' Association - Bill as Membership Chairman, Bonnie as Treasurer and President. They enjoyed many riverboat and ocean cruises and trips to Portland to visit their daughter Pam and family.

In 2016, they found their last "impossible dream" - CherryWood!

BOOK REVIEW

Jewelweed by David Rhodes

A second novel by David Rhodes centered in the Driftless region of SW Wisconsin, following his earlier novel "Driftless" by about 10 – 15 years. It is not quite a sequel, although it does have several of the "Driftless" characters and it is written in a similar style. It is plain, simple, often quirky, but not unrepresentative of the area, and showing wide and deep understanding of its culture. This book is a bit more action oriented than the previous book, but it still focuses on the inner thoughts and feelings of its characters (e.g. one of the characters is a devotee of the philosopher Spinoza). It's a big, long book, but easy to read and very rewarding. Read both books independently, or, if possible, successively.
