When Mary's health issues resulted in a move, Dick turned over the position of Editor of the CP to Joan Walborn, whom he had wisely chosen earlier to assist him. Later when Dick returned to CW, he left that responsibility to Joan, but does contribute occasionally. He soon resumed the leadership of the Travel Club, which he and Mary had started with Bob and Helen Eisenhart when they first lived here.

Dick has published several books – two on reptiles, one on relaxation techniques and several on the countries they visited. Travel was a great interest, including a trip to Sapporo, Japan, Portland's sister city. Their apartment displayed many souvenirs – most notably, Claude, a life-size knight in armor. This unusual statue startled a security guard one night when she went to check out a noise she thought she heard in their apartment!

Another of his projects has been arranging the Forum each month, featuring current topics of interest. He began that with Charles Nielsen originally and since his return, has renewed it, working with Jim Anderson and Jim Snodgrass. Interest in croquet playing had lagged and he revived that, taking charge of games in the summer. His talent in art is obvious, shown in his beautiful wood carvings. One handsome little gnome named Hans was so attractive, he was kidnapped from Dick's display shelf, to the dismay of us who enjoyed seeing him there on the way to the elevator. 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Dick, the youngest of three boys, was born in Gary, Indiana, where his father was the school principal. He graduated from the U of Chicago, then earned his Master of Social Work at Indiana U. He later received his Master of Public Administration from the University of Northern Colorado.

There were multiple jobs and experiences along the way. Ten years were spent on staff in three mental hospitals and there was an interesting six months in Mexico where he served with the American Friends Service Committee, helping people improve their agriculture system. Here he drove a van – the only vehicle in the area. A fight occurred during a parade which proved to be fatal, and Dick's van was needed to transport the body. When there was a fiesta nearby, the van provided transportation for two turkeys and 23 people, inside and outside! He was called upon once to conduct a Quaker meeting. He admits to enjoying the title of respect, he enjoyed there -- "Don Ricardo".

His social work involved working in a boys' school, being the county director of the War on Poverty, in San Luis Obispo, CA, and superintendent of the Eastern Oregon State Hospital in Pendleton. He has a son in Oakland, CA and a daughter near Savannah, GA.

When Dick retired and moved to Salem, he began publishing books for others who furnished him their manuscripts and, for awhile, had a Public Access TV program interviewing authors. After coming to CherryWood he was on call for a number of years to serve in court as a mental health evaluator.

We surely would have missed this person who "makes things happen" had they not chosen to live at CherryWood. By the way, you can read the Cherry Pit articles in the library. They have been bound into 3 three ring binders and kept up to date, many thanks to Joan! *Shirley Eggiman, Greens*

I cannot believe that we are already entering the month of May! It has been a very busy first half of the year that has incorporated some infrastructure improvements and leadership changes. Thus far I have been very pleased with the addition of Shadow Moon to our Leadership team as the Dining Services Director. She and Chef Adrian have excellent culinary chemistry and we are starting to see some of the foundational elements of the department come together and show sustainability.

Further, we made a change in relation to our Sales Director and Tye Gabriel is on board. Tye comes to our campus with a wealth of experience that he garnered by working at several of our communities in a sales role prior to applying for the CWV vacant position. Since starting, he has been a welcomed addition to the campus and can be seen engaging both prospective and current residents throughout the campus. Both Shadow and Tye are pro's at being "off task, but on purpose" and this is the CherryWood trademark that encourages our staff to put their heart before their hands...essentially run everything through the lens of our mission. Being "mission minded" is also something that I would like to see in an expanded partnership with our cherished residents, where we can mutually enter into conversations and challenges with a willingness to enhance each other's lives, without being misled by personal agendas. It's amazing how many different perspectives we receive from hundreds of residents, prospective residents, families, neighbors and employees.

Some exciting infrastructure news! We have signed agreements to update our pendant call system. This upgrade will be fairly seamless, but allows for much quicker response times, enhanced reporting and overall promotes resident safety. We also signed a contract with Touchtown which we have begun installing. This program will give us an internal closed caption TV Channel for Independent Living and Assisted Living, where we can run updates on upcoming events, provide live feed TV where we can speak to you directly in your apartment in the event of an emergency or if we shut down the dining room due to illness. Further information will be shared about this development!

Three new capital projects that received owners' approval in April include a new 6 ton HVAC system that supports all heating, cooling and airflow in the vitality center and VSG. Further we will be working on installing a new dehumidifier in the pool later this year. This is a huge project that will help remove all of the condensation that builds up in the pool area and should help prevent moisture escaping into the walls, thus leading to structural issues. Lastly, we will begin drafting to update and upgrade the vitality locker rooms. This upgrade will include enhancements to the entryways, flooring, showers and lockers.

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From President Bill Winkler:

We've been fortunate to have heard from Portland's Recycling program at our Town Hall. We've heard "how". Now let's get on board.

"Recycling" is a word in the American English language that has many meanings. The Recycling program here at CherryWood, with the bins in the Trash rooms, is part of the City of Portland's Recycling program. Portland's program does not re-use "things"; they re-use materials. For example, Portland has no customers who want plastic containers, but they DO have customers that re-use plastic. The plastic containers are, in gigantic quantities, reduced to usable plastic which is economically attractive to manufacturers. Similar for paper, metal and glass.

Some equate recycling with re-using; that thinking needs to be whittled down. Several residents have pointed out to me ways to re-use things. We, as a community, are good at that. Our many life experiences have shown us great ways to re-use. But Portland's program that we participate in does not re-use things, only materials.

Thus, our Recycling program is quite restrictive in what is good recycling. Since our (Portland's) customers require clean recycling, our individual recycling needs to conform. If the inspectors detect too much junk in a sample, the entire shipload of recycling will be rejected. Whoa! Not good. So, we need to realize that "Less" is better.

Yes, Portland does have people and machinery which are very good at producing acceptable recycling; but not perfect. By the way, if something doesn't fit perfect recycling, it gets thrown in the trash. Nobody tries to clean or disassemble or modify your "stuff"; it just goes into the trash, so YOU might just as well save them the trouble (and chance of missing it) and YOU throw it in the trash.

Yes, recycling takes effort. If you aren't willing to make the effort, throw it in the trash. But I am, and many are, hoping that you *are* willing to do it right. Our recycling customers set the rules, not us. Each of us (almost 360) has an idea how the recycling should be done, and they all differ. From each other and from Portland's program. Trust me. So, **we** need to conform to the ONE program or just give up and throw everything in the trash. I'm in, how about you?

Editor's Note: While Bill is talking about the Big Picture, I'll talk about the CW system. Each recycle location has blue bins for recyclable materials and a bucket for glass bottles. You put any trash, food containers, etc. in the bins – it all becomes TRASH.
