

Drawn to the light

The winged design of this home creates a number of courtyards and terraces that catch sun all day long, while extensive glazing ensures the interior is also light-filled

Every site offers its architect,

interior designer and building team an individual series of opportunities, challenges and constraints. Part of the skill of the team is to recognise which is which and how to make the most of the situation.

The new home featured here replaces an older house that was set among large, established trees. The owners saw the opportunity to make

more of the large, squareproportioned site that sloped up from the street, and asked architect Jason Bailey to design them a new family home.

"This provided us with an opportunity to utilise the site better, creating a home that would be flexible as the needs Bailey, project manager Paul of the family changed over Belcher of residential building time. There was also room for a private guest level, a swimming pool and plenty of easily

accessed indoor and outdoor living," says Bailey.

"We spread the house out on the site and used it to frame courtyards and terraces, so the sun could reach into all parts of the property," he says.

The project team included specialists, NZ Built, and interior designer Angela McCool of Trinity Interior Design.

Inside, it comprises two main wings, one public zone with living spaces and a second, two-level area with bedrooms and bathrooms. Interior consultancy Trinity Interior Design provided advice on colour, space planning, floor finishes and furnishings.


Because of the sloping nature of the site, the house has been designed to flow from the front, rising up through subtle in the guest suite. Here, spaces split levels to the courtyard and swimming pool at the back of the property.

These almost unnoticeable

shifts of a half-level at a time flow from the front door to the pool, which is raised slightly above the living area and landscaping level. A planter box around the pool doubles as a safety barrier and seat, avoiding the need for pool fencing.

The three stacking, pre-finished powdercoated doors between the two living areas provide a clear opening 4.6m high and 4.4m wide. A narrow strip of lighting runs along the top edge of the doors, creating an interesting detail and drawing attention to their

areas," says Bailey.

"Our aim was to strike a balance between creating distinct, generous spaces and allowing the various areas to spread out into each other."

says the owners' brief was clear. Sustainability was a key component, and they wanted a practical home that would be no-fuss and natural.

The modern architectural The overall aesthetic of the style of the house influenced the interior design. Natural materials such as timber, porstructure, but large areas of celain tiles and glass were selected, with the aim of adding lightness to the home's solid structure.

"Neutral coloured walls leave room for the owners to display their art collection, and to add to it over time," says the interior designer.

"The owners wanted highquality, New Zealand-made products where possible, that would not need replacing often," says Angela.

Despite the complexities, the project was completed on time and within the budget.


"Because of the large scale of the design and the challenges of the site, we worked from the back of the house to the front. Careful planning was a key element of our building programme because, once the house was built, we no longer had access to the rear of the site," says Belcher.
