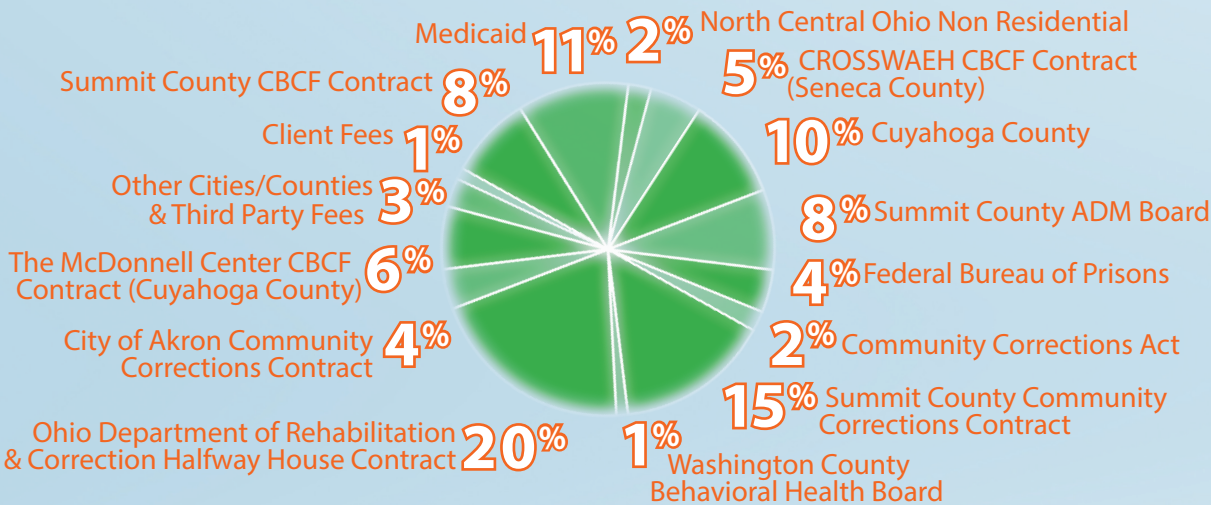

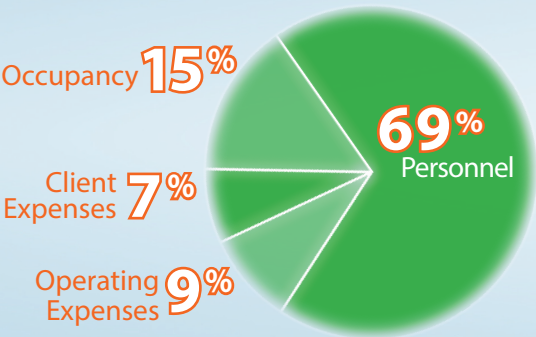

Highlights 2024

- The American Correctional Association (ACA) awarded perfect audit scores to four Oriana House facilities. The Summit County Community Based Correctional Facility (CBCF), Cliff Skeen CBCF, Residential Correctional Center, and Oriana House Reserve Center were reaccredited by the ACA and each received a 100% audit score.
- Oriana House's Electronic Monitoring (EM) received a Community Engagement Champion award from the University of Akron for visionary leadership and extraordinary commitment to the industry. EM averages a daily count of 1,200 clients on GPS or alcohol monitoring services.
- Oriana House was the recipient of the 2024 Outstanding Community Partner Service Award presented by Cuyahoga Community College (Tri-C). Tri-C has partnered with Oriana House for more than a decade to help clients reach short and long term education goals and participate in vocational workforce programs.
- Oriana House was honored to participate in Summit County's return of the Fugitive Safe Surrender Program. People with outstanding warrants had the opportunity to turn themselves in at a neutral site to have their cases resolved in a nonconfrontational environment.
- Oriana House dedicated a computer lab at North Star Neighborhood Reentry Resource Center as the Illya McGee Learning Lab in honor of the late Illya McGee who served as Oriana House Vice President of Correctional Programs in Cuyahoga County until his untimely passing in 2022. Mr. McGee began his career at Oriana House as a Resident Supervisor and became the agency's first African American Vice President during his 30-plus-year career. The Illya McGee Learning Lab also recognizes Mr. McGee's commitment to education.
- Aramark expanded its In2Work program in more Summit County facilities. Clients can participate in hands-on food service training with the final phase culminating in a test for the ServSafe certification from the National Restaurant Association. The first class of female clients all passed on their first exam. A ServSafe certification is beneficial in the restaurant industry and makes clients more employable. Graduates have the opportunity to apply for positions available through Aramark, and Aramark also offers scholarships to graduates.
- A \$20,000 grant from the Ohio Transformation Fund was awarded to Oriana House and utilized for a prison yoga program for clients in Cuyahoga County and a therapeutic theater program for clients in Summit County's Turning Point (drug court) Program. Through therapeutic theater, clients drew from their own experiences to write a script and perform their play.
- In partnership with Common Good Ohio, Oriana House began using virtual reality technology in Cuyahoga County as an additional tool to promote recovery and reduce recidivism. Therapeutic, immersive spaces were developed where clients could meditate and create virtual reality environments that support wellness and recovery.
- Oriana House provided staff and clients with sunglasses to view and celebrate the total solar eclipse on April 8.
- Oriana House was proud to support and have staff attend numerous events and causes throughout the year. Some of the events included participation in the Akron Marathon, Akron Corporate Challenge, Akron Pride Festival, Summit County ADM Recovery Challenge, Walk in Their Shoes, Max's Miles, Washington County Behavioral Health Board's Recovery Walk, the Summit County NAMI Walk, Hope Fostoria, Parkersburg Memorial Walk, and many more.
- A commissary was introduced at the McDonnell Center CBCF to offer clients the opportunity to purchase snacks, hygiene items, and other goods. A total of 58 orders amounted to \$2,478.26 in sales. A 10% commission of \$247.83 was used for the benefit of clients' welfare and recreation.

Continuum of Sanctions Model

Oriana House provides integrated rehabilitative services across the continuum of sanctions.

This continuum of sanctions is a nationwide model for successful community corrections programs.

Because many of the services are provided by Oriana House, offenders can easily be moved up and down the continuum, adding or removing restrictions as necessary, without interruption to programming.

Each step in the Continuum of Sanctions can be used in conjunction with one another or as a step up or down from one program to another.
