The design includes four essential elements of practice: academy development & structure, curriculum & instruction, advisory board, and work-based learning.



Academy Development & Structure

Curriculum & Instruction

NAF offers curriculum in growing industries and also approves programs of study that align with NAF's certification standards and federally-recognized career clusters, enabling local school districts to meet the needs of their community, as well as district and state requirements.

Advisory Board

Work-Based Learning
