A brief word from me

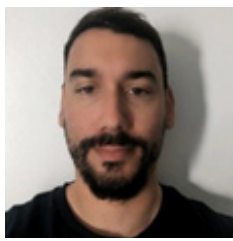

Collaborating to advance trusted research

Research integrity is a core priority for us, and to ensure the reliability and integrity of the research we publish, we focus on three areas: we set and uphold high standards of rigor and ethics in our publishing, we invest in human oversight and technology to help detect and prevent problematic content, and we collaborate with others on initiatives to safeguard trust in research. "To uphold the highest standards of publishing ethics, we are continuously investing in both human expertise and advanced technology. This includes expanding our Research Integrity & Publishing Ethics team and developing innovative tools to identify signs of malpractice at every stage of the publication process. These tools are now also capable of investigating fraud on a large scale, which enables us to identify and correct issues after expert validation.



While one of the most immediate outcomes we will observe is an increase in the number of corrections to the record, including potential retractions – made possible by our enhanced ability to conduct large-scale investigations – what we are most excited about is the expansion of these tools to earlier stages of the publication process, which will increasingly help prevent the publication of fraudulent articles. Your journals will be invited to participate in new pilot projects to use our tools, and if you haven't yet, you can expect to hear more about them soon." – [Sarah Jenkins, Senior Director, Research Integrity & Publishing Ethics](#).
