

## NETNEP 2026 Presentation Modes

### Oral (Paper/Platform) Presentation

Oral (paper) sessions allow authors to present papers for discussion detailing their latest research, education innovations and/or practice as educators within one of the 8 main themes. Any research reported MUST have commenced at the time of the abstract submission.

Oral sessions involve authors presenting for **20 minutes**, with 5 minutes allocated for discussion.

An abstract of not more than 300 words (plus between 2-5 references to support the evidence-base of the abstract content) is required.

### Poster Presentation

A poster presentation allows a presenter to provide a visual summary of their research and/or innovation, within one of the 7 main conference themes, to be displayed for sharing with conference delegates. There will be dedicated time allocated in the conference program for poster viewing by delegates and also an opportunity for poster presenters to be available to discuss their work with conference delegates on an individual basis.

A poster should be self-contained and self-explanatory, allowing different viewers to proceed on their own while the author is free to supplement or discuss particular points raised in enquiry.

An abstract of not more than 300 words (plus between 2-5 references to support the evidence-base of the abstract content) is required.

Any research reported MUST have commenced at the time of the abstract submission.

### Rapid 5s

Each hour-long “Rapid” session will consist of 9 oral presentations, each 5 minutes in duration. A ‘Rapid 5’ will allow presenters to showcase the research they are currently working on. Each presenter has 5 minutes, and a maximum of 3 slides, to present their work to the forum. A moderator will be present to help ensure the session runs on time. Presenters are welcome to exchange contact information with audience members after the session. There will 15 minutes of moderated discussion drawing all presenters and delegates back together at the end of the session.

An abstract of not more than 300 words (plus between 2-5 references to support the evidence-base of the abstract content) is required.
