# Young leaders: Sustainable-mountain development for future generations

Be inspired as Ms. Jean speaks about her projects, which unite multiculturalism and sustainable development and watch a video screening that gives you a deeper understanding on how fashion can be a tool for cooperative international development. ### **Creating Resilient Mountain Habitats**

The power of mountain rural planning is often overlooked. Its absence leads to uncontrolled, climatically, and seismically unfit construction, transforming mountain villages into peri-urban concrete extensions, devoid of identity and sustainable resources. These challenges are intensified by climate change and hazards: from earthquakes to rock falls, through to uncontrolled glacial, river and lake outbursts. Seismically resilient, climatically suited buildings coupled with sustainable, risk-sensitive land-use planning is not only critical to long-term sustainability of the environment but is also the crux of safety and sustainability.

This session will showcase how resilient planning can be scaled through rural mountain planning methods, integrating community engagement, data-driven decision-making, and spatial design. The discussion will touch upon the intersection of climate-change, hazard mitigation, the implications of long-term development interventions and mechanisms to leverage innovations at scale.

Every year, the world observes International Mountain Day (December 11) to promote awareness around mountain ecosystems and communities. This year, this milestone celebrates sustainable mountain tourism, a theme that comes against the backdrop of a pandemic that has suspended tourism activities around the world.

Mira Rai (Mountain Partnership Ambassador) will provide a glimpse of the majestic Himalayas, through a video message from Nepal, to call for the need to preserve them through sustainable mountain tourism. Jake Norton, a climber and filmmaker, will narrate his adventures and describe how mountains have evolved with the progression of climate change, as well as moderate the session.

# 14:40 – 15:40 Transforming disruptions to resilience: unlocking climate partnerships and scaling up innovations

With climate change increasing disruptions to mountain livelihoods and ecosystems, communities and grassroots organisations are relying on the reservoir of indigenous solutions and innovations to build resilience and accelerate adaptation efforts. However, scaling and sustaining such initiatives requires resources. (Ambassador of Ambassador Massimo Baggi, Switzerland to the UAE and Bahrain), will highlight the significance of long-term partnerships between key actors and sectors for creating innovative strategies and mechanisms.

The panel will convene diverse voices — private sector players, donors, and development agencies — who will share their recommendations on strategic partnerships and arrive at shared goals that can be adopted by stakeholder groups that are key for climate collaborations. Anna Giorgi (Delegate of the Rector of the University of Milan to the promotion of teaching, research and third mission activities for the valorisation of mountain areas – UNIMONT, University of Milan) will further highlight the positive influence of the educational alliances for sustainable mountain development.

## Resilience across regions: Case studies on Andes and Central Asia

These talks will feature stories, from the Himalayan, Andes and Central Asia regions, on how local initiatives are driving positive change.
