PEST: Mexican Rice Borer (Eoreuma Ioftini)

<u>BASIC PROFILE</u>: Adult MRB moths lay eggs on sugarcane, rice and other grasses. The larvae bore into the stem and damage the plant. Adults are creamy white to straw colored, $\sim 12-20$ mm long (3/8"–3/4") tip to tip. They have a distinctive small dark dot in the middle of each forewing. MRB can move in cane stalks or via natural flight.

<u>LDAF ACTIVITY</u>: LDAF conducts annual surveys for this pest using a pheromone lure. Traps are deployed most of the year in sugarcane and rice fields and at cane mills when in operation. MRB is moving our way from East Texas at a rate of ~15 miles/year. To date, only two moths have been found in western Louisiana. No sugarcane shipments from Texas are allowed. This helps to prevent man-assisted movement into the state.
