## FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

#### Kathrin Delutis

If 2020 has taught us anything, it's that we can't predict the future but we can plan for it. This past year we have "pivoted", "adapted", and been "resilient" as we responded to the needs of people and pets in our community, while keeping the health and safety of our staff, volunteers and community a priority.

March 2020 required us to quickly adapt our operations to ensure continued service delivery while not knowing how long these changes would be

required or what the overall impact would be. The only thing we had to go on, was what was happening in the United States, which was hundreds of animals being abandoned due to individuals experiencing illness, income loss, and homelessness. Shelters were being over-run as pets needed to be cared for and housed. Thousands of people were becoming ill and hospitalized, resulting in a shortage of staff being able to work in the shelters to care for the animals. The unknown regarding the virus and if animals could contract it or be a carrier were all things we needed to consider. And although a year later I can't say we are on the other side of these challenges, I can report that due to the dedication and perseverance of the staff, volunteers and our community, we have continued to support and care for many sick and abandoned animals while also helping individuals keep their pets in their homes, with their families.

This past year has taught us a great deal about what we are capable of as individuals and an organization. Our foster program is stronger than ever and we continue to grow that program. With reduced staff working in our centres, we cared for hundreds of animals, from providing emergency boarding to medical care, we were able to return "lost and found" animals to their families and we still ensured hundreds of animals found their forever homes.

In partnership with Kitchener Waterloo Pet Food Bank and the Cambridge and District Humane Society, we launched a Waterloo Region Emergency Pet Food Bank and at our Stratford Perth Centre, we also launched another local Emergency Pet Food Bank. This past year, with the support of individuals and businesses, we have provided hundreds of thousands of pounds of food to pet owners in Waterloo Region, Stratford, St. Marys and Perth County. Both of these Emergency Pet Food Banks continue to operate out of our centres.

Our communities, our volunteers, our corporate partners and our donors have continued to support us throughout the past year, ensuring we had the resources needed to care for the animals. Our fundraising efforts have changed significantly and many of our "annual" events and revenue generating programs were cancelled, but as we entered into 2021 we took the lessons learned and have continued to adapt how we fundraise, how we engage the community and how we continue to provide programs and services.

We don't know how COVID-19 will continue to impact us in 2021, but we do know that animals and their families will need us and we will continue to need each and every one of you to help us ensure all animals in our communities receive the care and love they deserve. We remain committed to making a difference and together we are stronger, and together we will get through this!

Thank you for your continued support! Stay safe, stay healthy and I look forward to seeing you back at our centres, programs and events soon!

# PIVOTING IN LIGHT OF COVID-19

Our Animal Service
Officers are out in
the community and the
Animal Care and the

Not everyone in our community is aware that the Humane Society is an essential service. Even though

public access to our shelters is by appointment only, our Animal Service Officers are out in the community and the Animal Care and the Veterinary staff continue to treat and look after the sick, injured, surrendered and stray animals in our centres.

Throughout this year, we've received many inquiries from the community and from the media to see how we are doing. Thank you for asking! It's been a challenging year, but with changes to our operating processes, additional precautions against COVID-19, and some creativity from our Development and Community Programming teams, we've stayed true to our mission.

We've seen so many changes this year that it's impossible to cover all of them, but here are a few of the big ones that we often get asked about.

#### What services were affected by COVID-19?

- Public medical services like rabies and spay/neuter clinics are now offered by appointment using a curbside delivery method that is also practiced by the majority of veterinarians in the Region.
- Adoption process is now primarily done online.
- Foster volunteers remain a crucial part of our organization, now more than ever, but we'll get to that in more detail later.
- Our fundraising campaigns have gone virtual.
- Our community programs like camps, birthday parties, school and educational programming, and dog training classes are now being offered online.
- Even with our Lost & Found services, we send pictures of stray animals to possible owners to try and make a match that way, rather than having the owner walk through our building.

....these changes are a health and safety precaution to limit the risk of COVID-19 in our Centres.

## How is the Humane Society supporting the community during the pandemic?

Our Executive Director, Kathrin Delutis, is an active member of the Community Services Working Group, which is part of the larger Waterloo Region Pandemic Control Group. The additional insight that she provides allows us to better manage the day-to-day planning and to be more strategic in helping the community during these challenging times. The two most notable free emergency services that we've offered to our community this year are Emergency Community Pet Food Banks and Emergency Pet Boarding. In the second half of 2020, the number of emergency boarders in our Kitchener Centre has increased by 75%. As these pet owners were hospitalized or too ill to care for their animals, we've given them the peace of mind that their pets are being taken care of while they recover. Meanwhile, the Emergency Pet Food Bank provided free food and pet supplies not only to individuals, but also to other organizations in need. Our Animal Service Officers carry extra bags of food in their vehicles and deliver them while they are out on patrol to our most vulnerable neighbourhoods.

## How has the adoption process changed and why are foster parents so important?


While our animals are waiting to be adopted, the majority of them are placed with our foster volunteers. There is actually a very limited number of animals physically in our centres. The rest are being cared for remotely and are brought in periodically for their medical and adoption appointments. All available animals for adoption are placed on our website. Anyone interested in adopting an animal has to fill out a form online. Our staff will review their application and if they are deemed a good fit, they will set up a time for the foster parent to bring in the animal for them to meet at the centre.

#### Have adoptions gone up during the pandemic?

Adoptions at the Humane Society have been steady. Keep in mind that even with an increase in people looking to adopt pets, the only ones that the Humane Society has for adoption are animals that have been brought in as surrenders, strays, and occasional transfers from other organizations.

#### Has there been an increase in pet surrenders?

Thankfully, we have not seen an increase in people surrendering pets.



Having said that, we are limiting the number of surrenders that we are able to take in due to a reduced number of staff who are physically working in our centres. Ideally, we want to keep animals in their current homes, so we work with pet owners and provide support where we can to help them keep their animals instead of surrendering them.

#### Has fundraising been affected by COVID-19?

Many people believe that the Humane Society is an arm of the government, but that's not true. We do hold contracts with local governments to provide animal control services. These contracts make up about a third of our operating budget – meaning that the bulk of what the Humane Society does, it does as a charity.

This year, due to our inability to host many of our fundraising events, our development team pivoted to include a variety of new and creative digital fundraisers. With many options, like online photo contests, poker tournament, comedy show, and even a wine tasting with an online sommelier, the team continued their outreach efforts to raise the funds needed to care for the animals in our centres. But despite their best efforts, we've seen a decrease by over a quarter in our fundraising revenues in 2020 vs 2019.

We are hopeful that at some point in 2021, we will be able to resume our in person services and programming and be able to thank our loyal supporters and ambassadors in person.

In 2020, the majority of our animals were placed in foster care with our foster volunteers. Our foster caregivers have been an incredible support during the COVID-19 pandemic. They help provide a safe place for our animals to recover from procedures, feed them,

and give them the love and attention they need and deserve while waiting to find their fur-ever families. By providing a warm and welcoming temporary home, our foster parents help our animals blossom and shine. To our amazing team of foster volunteers, thank you for opening your homes to the animals in need in our community.

#### Independent Auditor's Report >>



To the Board of Directors of: The Humane Society of Kitchener Waterloo & Stratford Perth

#### **Qualified Opinion**

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of The Humane Society of Kitchener Waterloo & Stratford Perth, which comprise the statement of financial position as at December 31, 2020 and the statements of revenues and expenditures, changes in fund balances and cash flows for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies.

In our opinion, except for the effects of the matter described in the Basis for Qualified Opinion paragraph, these financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of The Humane Society of Kitchener Waterloo & Stratford Perth as at December 31, 2020 and the results of its operations and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not for profit organizations.

#### **Basis for Qualified Opinion**

In common with many charitable organizations, the organization derives some of its revenues from donations and fundraising, the completeness of which is not susceptible to satisfactory audit verification. Accordingly, our verification of these revenues was limited to the amounts recorded in the records of the organization and we were not able to determine whether any adjustments might be necessary to revenues, excess of revenues over expenditures and cash flows from operations for the years ended December 31, 2020 and 2019, current assets as at December 31, 2020 and 2019, and net assets as at January 1 and December 31 for both the 2020 and 2019 years. Our audit opinion on the financial statements for the year ended December 31, 2019 was modified accordingly because of the possible effects of this limitation in scope.

We conducted our audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are independent of The Humane Society of Kitchener Waterloo & Stratford Perth in accordance with the ethical requirements that are relevant to our audit of the financial statements in Canada, and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our qualified audit opinion.

#### Responsibilities of Management and Those Charged with Governance for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not for profit organizations and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is responsible for assessing the organization's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to a going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless management either intends to liquidate the organization or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

Those charged with governance are responsible for overseeing the organization's financial reporting process.

#### Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements, as a whole, are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

As part of an audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards, we exercise professional judgement and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit. We also:

#### Financial Report >>

- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or override of internal control.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the organization's internal control.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates and related disclosures made by management.
- Conclude on the appropriateness of management's use of the going concern basis of accounting and, based on the audit evidence obtained, whether a material uncertainty exists related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the organization's ability to continue as a going concern. If we conclude that a material uncertainty exists, we are required to draw attention in our auditor's report to the related disclosures in the financial statements or, if such disclosures are inadequate, to modify our opinion. Our conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of our auditor's report. However, future events or conditions may cause the organization to cease to continue as a going concern.
- Evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the financial statements, including the disclosures, and whether the financial statements represent the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation.

We communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit and significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that we identify during our audit.
