Warren G. Harding | Lesson Plan

What defines a successful presidency?



Students will understand how Warren G. Harding's policies ended a major depression and improved the lives of millions of Americans while also evaluating his leadership amidst challenges.

Learning Objectives:

- Identify the key life events of Warren G. Harding.
- Explain how Warren G. Harding earned the reputation of being charismatic.
- Record the key challenges, achievements, and historical factors of Harding's presidency.
- Evaluate how Harding managed his administration and if his reputation is deserved.

Key Vocabulary:

- **Charismatic**: Having attractive or charming qualities that inspire admiration and devotion from others.
- Roaring Twenties: The nickname for the decade from 1920 to 1929, remembered for great prosperity.
- Editorial: An article in a newspaper that expresses an opinion.
- Women's Suffrage: The right of women to vote.
- **Segregation**: The separation of people by race.
- Scandal: An event involving dishonest and/or illegal activity that provokes outrage.

What You'll Need

Lesson Plan: Read and Discuss (60 minutes)

Introduction to Harding: (5 minutes)

 Begin with a brief discussion about U.S. presidents and the qualities that make a leader great or controversial. Ask students if they know any presidents who were known for their leadership during challenging times.



2. Display the *Warren G. Harding* digital book on a screen. Briefly highlight Harding's significance as the 29th president, his rise from small-town beginnings, and his campaign slogan proposing a "return to normalcy." Show images from the digital book to give a visual overview of his life and achievements.

Harding History Huddle: (25 minutes)

- 1. Read the "Meet Warren G. Harding" section on page 2 together as a class, with the teacher leading this page to model fluent reading and set the tone for the lesson.
- 2. After completing the teacher-led reading, explain that students will now explore other key aspects of Harding's life in small groups.
- 3. Split the class into small groups and assign each group a different section of the digital book to explore. The following are recommendations:
 - o Group 1: Young Warren, Education, Family, and Early Career (pages 3-4)
 - Group 2: Rise to Powers, President (pages 5-6)
 - Group 3: Roaring Twenties, Harding Speaks Out for Civil Rights (page 7)
 - Group 4: Legacy (page 8)
- 4. Allow time for each group to read their assigned section, taking turns reading aloud. As students read, they should discuss the main ideas.
- 5. Provide each group with a large piece of paper or a poster board and markers to write down key points and any interesting facts or quotes they find.
- 6. Allow each group one to two minutes to present their findings to the class. After each presentation, provide time for classmates to ask questions and discuss the content.

Worksheet Workshop: (15 minutes)

- 1. Hand out individual copies of the worksheet to each student. Explain how to fill out each section of the worksheet with these instructions:
- 2. **Timeline**: Students should select key dates and events mentioned throughout the digital book. The following are recommendations, but the teacher and students can use many other dates mentioned in the book:
 - o 1865 Birth of Warren G. Harding, November 2.
 - 1884 Harding buys the *Marion Star* newspaper and begins his career in journalism.
 - 1899 Elected to the Ohio State Senate, beginning his political career.
 - o 1914 Becomes a U.S. Senator for Ohio.
 - o 1920 Wins the presidential election and becomes the 29th president.
 - o 1923 Dies in office on August 2 from a heart attack.
- 3. **Interesting Quote**: Have students choose a meaningful quote from the book to fill in the quote section on their worksheet.
- 4. **Interesting Fact**: Ask students to select an interesting fact about Warren G. Harding that stood out to them and write it in the space provided.
- 5. **Vocabulary Builder**: Instruct students to choose a word from the Glossary on page 14 that they find interesting and use it in a sentence that conveys its meaning.

6. **Multiple Choice**: Explain that students should complete the multiple-choice section of the worksheet individually. (Note: The multiple-choice section corresponds to the *Guess or Mess* episode about Warren G. Harding and can also be used to play along while watching. See "Extension Activity" below.)

Reflection Round-Up: (10 minutes)

- 1. Briefly summarize the key points covered about Harding, focusing on his life, presidency, and legacy.
- 2. **Think-Pair-Share**: Ask students to recall one fact about Harding and share it with a partner. Encourage them to discuss why that fact was significant.
- 3. Give each student a sticky note or index card and ask them to answer one of these three sample reflection questions:
 - What did you find most interesting about Harding's presidency?
 - Do you agree that his economic policies helped America prosper? Why or why not?
 - How might Harding's struggles with scandals influence how leaders are remembered?
- 4. **Bonus Activities**: If time allows, allow students to complete the puzzle on page 2 by finding hidden letters throughout the book. They can also explore and engage with the other interactive activities included in the book.

Extension Activity: (20 minutes)

Guess or Mess Trivia Show: After the lesson, students can participate in the Guess or Mess trivia show for Warren G. Harding—direct students to the multiple-choice section of the worksheet. Students can play along with the contestants to see if they can answer the trivia questions correctly.
