Making Connections: The Case of Playground Fairness

Background:

- Recently, some students and playground supervisors have noticed that the rule is not always followed, leading to disagreements.

The Case:

• **Incident Details**: On a specific day, two students, Alex and Jordan, got into a dispute. Alex claimed that Jordan had exceeded the 10-minute limit, while Jordan disagreed.

- **Witness Accounts**: Several other students were waiting in line at the time. Two of them, Sam and Riley, expressed differing views on whether Jordan exceeded the time limit.
- **Supervisor's Note:** The playground supervisor, Mr. Lee, was overseeing the area but was momentarily distracted by another matter and did not have a precise timing of Jordan's turn.

Your Role as the Judge:

Students should assess whether the rule was broken based on the given incident details, witness accounts, and the supervisor's note. Look for logical reasoning in their verdicts. Evaluate students' decisions on the importance of witness reliability, the supervisor's role, and the need for accurate timing methods in determining if the rule was broken.

Here is one example of a possible class ruling:

Rule review: The rule is fair and clear, and all students admit to understanding it. Evidence review: It seems unclear if the rule was broken because of the conflicting witness accounts. Since the evidence is unclear, Jordan should receive the benefit of the doubt. Future Prevention: To prevent future disputes, the yard supervisor should make use of a visible timer and let students know when their time begins and ends, or have a stopwatch that can be passed along to the next student waiting in line.
