#### Part 1: Quick Facts

Year of Birth and Location: January 16, 1902, in Tientsin, China

Chosen Sport: Running 100-meter, 200-meter, and 400-meter races

Facts about Liddell: Write one fact for each of the following sections.

Accept reasonable answers. The following are examples.

Early Life:

Born to Scottish missionary parents in China and moved to Scotland for school.

Athletic Achievements:

 Won the gold in the 400-meter race and the bronze in the 200-meter race at the 1924 Olympics.

Faith and Integrity:

• Refused to run the 100-meter race at the Olympics because it was scheduled on Sunday, honoring his religious beliefs.

Missionary Work:

• Returned to China to continue his parents' missionary work, helping people even after the Japanese invasion in WWII.

(Example Answer): Eric's strong Christian faith, his upbringing by missionary parents, and his commitment to his beliefs helped him remain strong and maintain his integrity, even in the most challenging circumstances.
