

- 3. The British were in a massive war against their arch-nemesis, <u>France</u>, led by the military genius <u>Napoleon</u>.
- 4. Since the British needed all the help they could get to defeat their opponent, they kidnapped American sailors and forced them to fight for the British navy.
- The President during this time, <u>James Madison</u>, also known as the Father of the <u>Constitution</u>, decided America needed to stand up for itself. So, in <u>1812</u>, they declared war on Great Britain and began the fight.
- 6. Francis Scott Key was sent to a ship in the <u>Baltimore Harbor</u> to <u>negotiate</u> the release of an American prisoner.

- 7. The British had over 50 ships that attacked <u>Fort McHenry</u> and had plans to conquer the city of <u>Baltimore</u>.
- 8. Francis Scott Key wrote the "Star-Spangled Banner" poem on the back of a letter he used in the prisoner negotiations.
- 9. What was Francis Scott Key's poem first titled, and why was it changed?

 The poem was first titled "Defence of Fort McHenry" and then changed to "The Star-Spangled Banner" because that was what people started calling the flag that survived the Battle of Baltimore Harbor.
- 10. How did they know who was victorious in the battle?
 In the morning, they would know who was victorious by which flag was flying above the fort.
- 11. Why were there 15 stars and stripes on the American flag during the War of 1812?

 That's how many states America currently had at this time. The design would shift as different states were added to the Union.
- 12. How many stars are on the American flag **now**, and why?

 There are currently 50 stars on the American flag because there are 50 states in the U.S.
