- 8. What did Ida B. Wells call her newspaper, and why?

 Ida B. Wells named her newspaper "The Free Speech and Headlight" because she believed, "The way to right wrongs is to turn the light of truth upon them." She felt that investigative journalism should uncover the truth and that freedom of information would improve America and the world.
- 9. How did Ida B. Wells use her skills as a journalist to put an end to the injustice black people in the South were facing during her time?
 Ida B. Wells used her journalism skills to investigate and expose lynching, revealing the brutal realities of racial violence and injustice. Her writings raised awareness and rallied support for anti-lynching and civil rights movements. By interviewing witnesses and

- utilizing freedom of the press, she brought global attention to the issue and inspired people to organize against lynching.
- 10. Besides her writing, what else did Ida B. Wells do to make a difference and help black people gain their full rights in America? In 1884, Ida B. Wells was forced to move from the First Class Ladies' car to the smoking car on a train just because of the color of her skin. She refused and was dragged away by conductors. Upset by this treatment, she wrote articles and sued the railroad. Although she initially won, the Tennessee Supreme Court later reversed the ruling.

Making Connections:

- 11. In the video, Leo and Layla realize the importance of Ida B. Wells' efforts to expose injustices. According to Ida B. Wells, what is the way to right wrongs? Leo and Layla realize that when journalists like Ida B. Wells work hard to expose bad things, they are exercising their Constitutional rights of free speech and a free press. People might be made uncomfortable by what a brave and honest reporter exposes, but the way to right wrongs is to turn the light of truth upon them.
- 12. What qualities do you think made Ida B. Wells a strong leader and advocate for change? Provide evidence from the video to support your answer.

 Ida B. Wells's courage, determination, resilience, and passion for justice made her a strong leader and advocate for change. She was not afraid to speak out against injustice and was committed to fighting for equality and civil rights, even though many people didn't want to hear what she had to say. People even broke into her offices, burned her printing presses, and drove her from Memphis, but she did not give up or back down.
- 13. What does Ida B. Wells' story teach you about the importance of bravery and honesty in standing up for what is right? Provide a specific example of how you can apply this lesson to your own life.
 Sample answer: Ida B. Wells' story teaches how bravery and determination can make a difference by standing up for what is right, even in the face of adversity. Her actions remind us of the importance of courage, perseverance, and fighting for equality and justice for all. I am inspired by Ida B. Wells' story to stand up for students who get bullied at my school.
