His father set him up with an apprenticeship, and he was on track to have a nice life as a printer, but that wasn't enough for him. He dreamed of bigger things, and his American Dream got him to Philadelphia at the age of 17. He chose to leave the security and comfort of home. Thanks to hard work and some good ideas, Franklin lived an incredible life as a printer, a businessman, a writer, a scientist, an inventor, a freedom fighter, and a statesman.
- 7. What did Benjamin Franklin do in France that was essential to America's independence? If Benjamin Franklin had not secured assistance from France, there was not a chance that the U.S. would have defeated the British and won our independence. They provided money, supplies, troops, and naval support.

- 8. In the video, Layla says, "Even though we don't have a nobility or monarchy, some people are born into better situations than others." According to Benjamin Franklin, does this affect the American Dream?
 - Sample answer: Benjamin Franklin explains that because every human is unique, the natural outcome of equal opportunity is unequal results. Even when treated equally, people don't always end up in the same place. Some will have less, and some will have more. What's special about America is that what matters is not where you come from but where you're headed—not who you have been or what you have now, but what you can become.
