
TRIBUTES FOR ADAM PRAKASH



It is with a profound sense of loss that we learned about the passing of a valued colleague and friend, Adam Prakash on Friday 7 April, 2023.

Adam worked as Senior Economics Adviser - Governance of Food Systems, where he was instrumental in bringing a computational lens to our work, exploring early warning and action systems in the context of transboundary pest/pathogen detection and control. While words will never adequately express the void left by his untimely passing, we have gathered the following reflections from colleagues who worked most closely with him at TMG Research gGmbH.

Adam Prakash was a dear friend, very trusted colleague and a sparring partner for testing new ideas (he won most of the "fights"!)

We first met in 2008 when I was at the Food and Agriculture Organization of the UN (FAO) when he supported my preparations for the High-Level-Summit on World Food Security and the Challenges of Climate Change and Bioenergy. The Summit gathered around 60 Heads of State and Government and more than 6,000 participants from all over the world. The preparatory process was a difficult and complex one and required careful scrutiny of all documents to ensure our facts and data were well grounded. I witnessed at close quarters one of Adam's many strengths: he was a Master of Statistics!

Years later, Adam joined us at TMG, working with our food systems research team for more than one year. His knowledge of agricultural, environmental, and economic statistics was unique. Without exaggeration, it can be said that he was one of the world's top experts in these fields. He had unparalleled technical skills in dealing with data and information, including the fields of machine learning and artificial intelligence. But he was not just a number cruncher. His ability to transform data into reliable information on up-coming threats and risks was mind blowing. This was evident in his passion for early warning systems, and his ideas on how to make the best use of terabytes of meteorological and climate data. In the last few months, Adam has been instrumental in advancing our work on how to apply digitalization for the benefit of people and the planet. He has also supported us to set up much needed databases for the nutritional value of European diets as our contribution to the Horizon Europe project, PLAN'EAT.



Adam and I regularly strategized about world food security and sustainability, and the role of digitalization in achieving these fundamental goals. We discussed how to further develop TMG as a home of reliable data and information to guide our ideas on linking global goals with local action. Adam helped us advance our ideas around the "Counter Current Principle" to answer the question: "how to initiate transformation towards sustainability" He proposed that this approach should be accompanied by different ways of interpreting and analyzing statistical information.

For these and many more reasons, Adam will be greatly missed. I will miss him greatly as an adviser, and a valued friend. My thoughts are with his family, especially his two daughters. I am grateful that I was able to say good bye to him on behalf of all his colleagues and friends in TMG.

Adam was a genuine source of inspiration to many, setting an example of hard work, dedication, and passion. His contributions to TMG were invaluable, and his absence will be sorely felt.
