**Living in Florida means** outdoor fun, but also risks from venomous snakes like rattlesnakes, coral snakes, cottonmouths, and copperheads. Here's how to keep your pet safe and what to do if a snakebite occurs.

#### Pit Vipers (Rattlesnakes, Cottonmouths, Copperheads)

- Causes swelling, bleeding, and significant pain.
- We keep antivenom in stock and treat these bites onsite.
- Exact snake identification isn't necessary the same antivenom works for all pit vipers.

## Coral Snakes

- Rare but very dangerous venom causes paralysis.
- · Bites often don't swell and can be hard to spot.
- If your pet is near a coral snake or you suspect a bite, call us immediately.

### SIGNS OF A BITE

- Sudden yelping or pain
- Swelling or bruising (common with pit vipers)
- · Bleeding at bite site
- Weakness, collapse, or lethargy
- Vomiting or drooling
- Difficulty breathing or paralysis (possible with coral snakes)

### WHAT TO DO

- Stay calm and keep your pet quiet and still
- Remove collars, harnesses, or anything constricting near swelling
- If safe, take a photo of the snake do NOT try to catch or bring it
- Call us immediately and head to our hospital

## **TREATMENT**

#### **Pit Viper Bites:**

- Antivenom
- · Pain relief
- · IV fluids & close monitoring

#### **Coral Snake Bites:**

- Stabilization
- Referral to the University of Florida for antivenom if needed

#### Do NOT:

- · Apply ice or a tourniquet
- · Attempt to suck out venom
- Give any medications at home, as they can be harmful

## PREVENTING BITES

- Supervise your pets outdoors, especially in tall grass or wooded areas.
- Avoid areas where snakes hide: brush piles, wood stacks, rocks.
- · Keep your yard clear by mowing and removing debris.
- Train your dog to obey commands like "leave it."
