- Avoid costumes that restrict movement, breathing, or vision.
- Ensure no small parts can be chewed off and swallowed.
- If your pet seems stressed or anxious, skip the costume, comfort is more important than cuteness!

Excited children, flashing lights, and strangers can make pets anxious. Keep your pets in a quiet, safe room with familiar toys and bedding while the doorbell rings repeatedly. This reduces stress and prevents accidents or escapes.

Monitor for Neurological Signs

Halloween treats or stress can sometimes trigger neurological events, especially in pets with pre-existing conditions. Watch for:

- Unsteady walking or stumbling
- Head tilting or circling
- Seizures or unusual tremors

If you notice any of these signs, contact your veterinarian immediately.
