### Practice sentences



Tamariki will love practicing sentences with kaiako that relate to the colourful image on each alphabet magnet. Repetition is important to help solidify their learning.

Ask tamariki to repeat the pronunciation of the syllables after you (e.g. ka, ma, ti).

Be sure to pay close attention to macrons and making sure you elongate the vowel sound.
