

Which Airlines Should You Consider for International Travel? Complete Guide

Choosing the right airline for a long-haul trip affects more than just comfort.

It shapes your layover options, how well you sleep on a 12-hour flight, and how easily you reach places off the beaten path.

According to [AirlineRatings.com's 2026 rankings](#), which judge airlines purely on measurable inflight product rather than public voting, Qatar Airways currently holds the top spot for full-service international carriers, with Cathay Pacific and Singapore Airlines close behind.

Skytrax's own World Airline Awards, widely considered the industry's other major benchmark, named Qatar Airways the World's Best Airline in 2025, with Singapore Airlines in second place and Cathay Pacific third.

The [2026 Skytrax results](#) are due at a ceremony in London this month, based on a survey covering more than 100 nationalities.

Here's a closer look at the airlines that consistently rank at the top for international travel, and what actually sets each one apart.

Qatar Airways: Best Overall for Long-Haul Comfort

[Qatar Airways](#) has topped both major industry rankings repeatedly, largely on the strength of its Qsuite business class, which offers private, door-enclosed suites that can convert into a double bed for couples traveling together.

Its economy product holds up well too, with generous entertainment options and consistently praised catering out of its Doha hub.

The airline's global network runs almost entirely through Hamad International Airport in Doha, which makes it a strong option for travelers connecting between Europe, Africa, Asia, and Australia on a single stopover.

Singapore Airlines: Best for First Class and Premium Service

Singapore Airlines has built its reputation on consistency, and its first class product remains one of the most talked-about in commercial aviation.

On the Airbus A380, its Suites feature a separate full-size bed and an individual lounge chair in an enclosed private space, a level of separation few other airlines offer even in first class.

Beyond the hardware, Singapore Airlines is frequently singled out for cabin crew service, and its Changi Airport hub, named Skytrax's Airport of the Year for the 14th time, makes layovers considerably more pleasant than most international connections.

Cathay Pacific: Best for Economy Class Comfort

If you're flying economy on a long international route, Cathay Pacific is consistently rated among the most comfortable options.

Its A350 economy cabin offers around 32 inches of seat pitch, more generous than the 30 inches common on many competing airlines, along with a four-way adjustable headrest that noticeably helps with sleeping upright.

Operating out of Hong Kong International Airport, Cathay Pacific serves as a convenient connection point for travel across East Asia, and its economic comfort has made it a repeat winner in that specific category at the Skytrax awards.

Emirates: Best for Entertainment and Onboard Extras

Emirates has built its brand around making a long flight feel like part of the trip rather than something to endure.

Its ICE inflight entertainment system offers thousands of channels across every cabin, and its onboard chef service and shower spa in first class remain distinctive even among premium carriers.

Flying through Dubai International Airport gives Emirates an unusually central position for connecting the Americas, Europe, Africa, Asia, and Australia, which makes it a practical choice as much as a comfortable one for travelers covering long distances with a single stopover.

Turkish Airlines: Best for Global Route Network

If reaching an unusual destination matters more to you than which specific airline gets you there, Turkish Airlines is worth serious consideration.

According to Turkish Airlines' own route map, the airline flies to more countries than any other carrier in the world, connecting travelers to well over 300 destinations across more than 130 countries from its mega-hub at Istanbul Airport.

That reach makes Turkish Airlines a particularly strong option if your itinerary includes a less common destination in Central Asia, Africa, or the Middle East, where competing carriers often

require two or three connections instead of one. Its economy catering, prepared by the DO&CO kitchen in Istanbul, also holds up well against other full-service carriers on long routes.

If you're planning a trip on Turkish Airlines, it's worth checking current promotions before booking.

Japan Airlines and ANA: Best for Safety and Reliability

Japan's two major carriers, Japan Airlines (JAL) and All Nippon Airways (ANA), consistently rank among the world's safest and most punctual airlines.

JAL holds a strong safety record spanning more than three decades without a fatal accident, and both airlines are known for precise, unhurried service that reflects broader Japanese hospitality standards.

JAL's business class on the Boeing 787-9, known as JAL Sky Suite, uses a herringbone layout with lie-flat beds exceeding 70 inches, and its economy cabins on long-haul routes include noise-canceling headsets as standard, a detail many competitors reserve for premium cabins.

Korean Air: Best Value Full-Service International Option

Korean Air won AirlineRatings' top overall spot in both 2024 and 2025 before slipping slightly in the 2026 rankings, and it remains a strong choice for travelers who want a full-service international experience without paying premium-carrier prices.

The airline is particularly known for spacious economy seating and a comfortable, understated business class product.

Operating from Incheon International Airport, Korean Air offers convenient connections across Asia, along with a growing set of long-haul routes to North America and Europe.

Air New Zealand: Best for Economy Class Innovation

Air New Zealand's Skycouch, a row of economy seats that converts into a flat surface for lying down, remains one of the more genuinely useful economy innovations in long-haul travel, and it's a major reason the airline won AirlineRatings' best economy award.

For travelers flying long distances on a budget who still want to arrive rested, it's a distinctive option most other airlines don't offer.

How to Choose the Best Airline for Your Trip

The "best" airline depends heavily on what you're optimizing for on a given trip.

A few factors worth weighing before you book:

- **Route and connections:** A highly rated airline that requires two extra connections may cost you more time than a slightly less polished one flying direct
- **Cabin class:** Rankings for first class, business class, and economy often differ significantly, so check the category that actually matches your ticket
- **Layover airport:** A long connection through a well-designed hub airport, like Singapore Changi or Istanbul, is far more pleasant than the same layover somewhere with fewer amenities
- **Loyalty program alignment:** If you already have status or points with a specific airline alliance, staying within that network often outweighs a marginal comfort difference elsewhere
