## **Key Concepts**

- The scriptures point to God who created the world and loves the world.
- Caring for creation is part of discipleship as a Christian
- One issue we sometimes encounter in certain framings of Christianity is that this world is bad, and we are waiting to escape from it to go up into heaven, which is something and somewhere else
- God created the world good, and he was pleased with what he made.
- Looking after creation is part of what it means to be made in the image of God
- Creation has gone wrong because of the way humanity has treated it.
- In the scriptures, the land mourns when the people don't follow
   God and don't practice social justice.
- We need to understand our place as humans who are part of the natural world.
- We need to understand just how much God loves creation
