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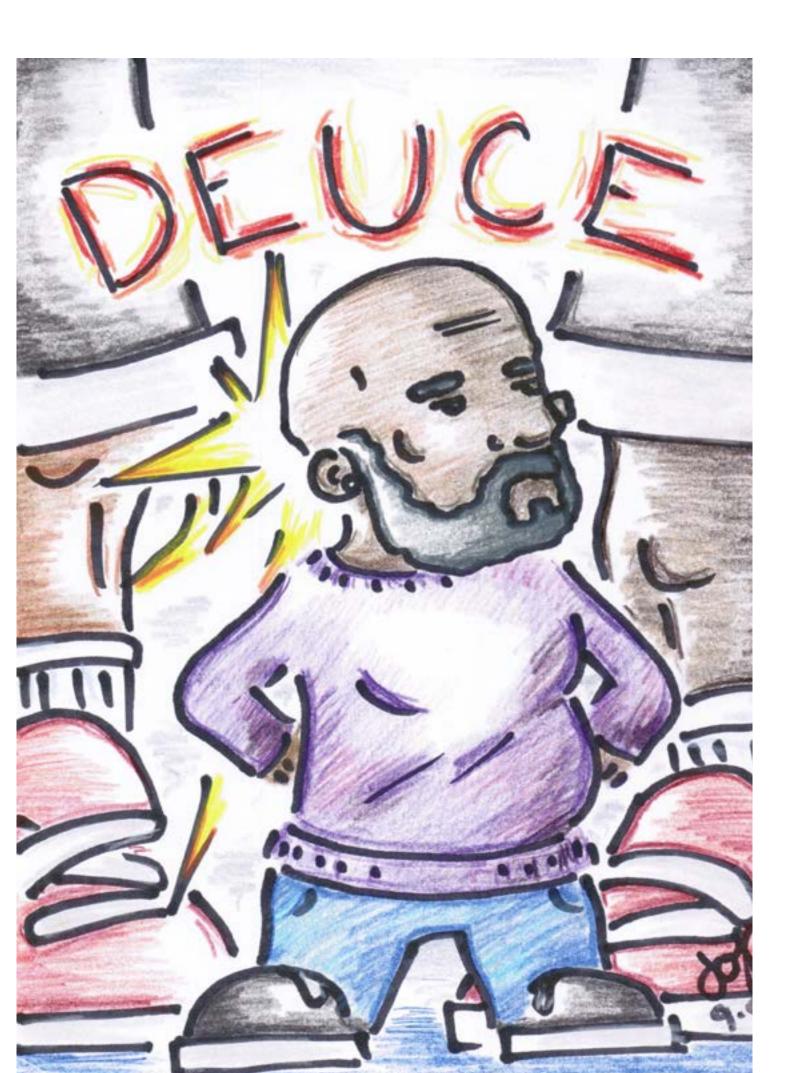

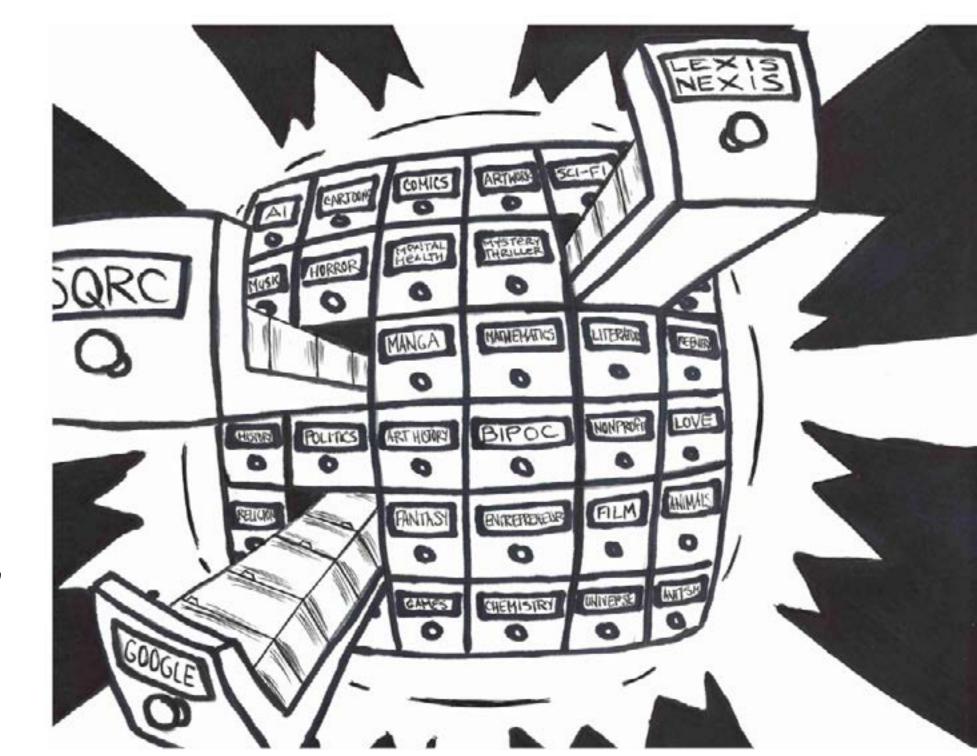
Library Futures provides an outlet and an audience for the research network's boldest questions and ideas. Project formats range from zines to research papers and resource templates.
