As we begin this report, we acknowledge the recent resignation of our CEO, Malindi, whose leadership has helped guide Outward Bound through a period of meaningful growth and impact. Young people in our country continue to report feelings of isolation, loneliness, screen addiction and stress. Our students tell us that Outward Bound changes this for them, and our research tells us that this impact lasts a lifetime. Together, we're changing lives.

FY2025 was a defining year for Outward Bound as we laid important foundations for long-term sustainability. Despite a challenging economic environment, the Board & Management team has remained focussed on ensuring our financial resilience and strengthening our ability to deliver life-changing experiences to more New Zealanders in a rapidly evolving world.

This year we closed out year two of a five-year strategy and we've made some real progress. We welcomed 1,815 students in Anakiwa - the highest number in our history.

We have also delivered a major digital transformation, launching a new CRM, website and enrolment experience, alongside updated finance and payroll systems. These changes are already transforming how we work and setting us up for greater reach and impact, as well as ensuring we can be efficient as we grow.

We piloted our first course for Muslim refugee wāhine - a meaningful milestone in our commitment to creating inclusive, life-changing experiences for all. We also grew our Asian student base by 44%.

We welcomed a growing community of donors and supporters who are committed to supporting young New Zealanders to realise their potential and overcome the growing challenges modern life is throwing at them.

Despite the challenging economic climate, we're so grateful to our supporters who have stuck with us and even increased their giving. Thank you - your generosity is what enables us to impact young people like Latoya and Cyrus and shift the course of their future.

Our team continues to evolve, too. We farewelled Hamish Reid and welcomed Dan Blessing as School Director in Anakiwa. In Auckland, we said goodbye to Tim Helliwell and welcomed Laura Platt to the leadership team as our new Head of Finance. Around the board table, we farewelled deputy Chair Cheewei Kwan and welcomed Mark Synnott and Del Hart.

Together, we express our gratitude to the wider governance and management team for their resilience, leadership and commitment this year. Like you, we all share a belief that Outward Bound has never been more relevant for young people, and together we move into FY26 with momentum and confidence in the journey ahead.



Investment markets were significantly disrupted in early 2025, but fortunately had largely recovered by the end of June. Despite these market challenges, our investments provided solid returns throughout the year.

Economic conditions in New Zealand led to fundraising challenges and a drop in self-funded course enrolments. In response, we awarded more scholarships from the Foundation than in previous years, which ensured a diverse range of students attended Outward Bound - a commitment we're proud to uphold.

Donations to the Foundation nearly doubled the previous year's gifts. We gratefully acknowledge the estates of Sue Dick and Jeanette Crean, with Jeanette's estate contributing a significant portion of this increase.

Donations and growth in our investment portfolio brought our total assets to just over \$29 million, up from \$27 million the previous year. This growth strengthens our ability to support Outward Bound's mission and ensures it's long-term sustainability.

To secure Outward Bound's future, we aim to double our Foundation's investments. It's the extraordinary generosity of supporters like Jeanette and Sue who leave a gift in their will, which will enable young people to receive scholarships for Outward Bound now, and for years to come.

For Outward Bound to keep changing young New Zealander's lives we need more supporters to leave a legacy gift in their will, and I encourage anyone who would like to make a lasting impact to speak with our team.

LATOYA'S JOURNEY

Earlier this year, we asked our community to help fund a scholarship for Latoya, a young woman eager to take on an Outward Bound course. Latoya lives with Autism and Cerebral Palsy, and like many young people living with disabilities, she often faces barriers to access and inclusion. Yet her determination and spirit shone through.

Latoya's goal was Youth Horizons, a one-week course designed for rangatahi with intellectual disabilities. With smaller groups, additional support, and a slower pace, the course still delivers the full Outward Bound experience - sailing, camping, bush adventures, high ropes - with adaptations that ensure everyone can participate meaningfully.

Thanks to the generosity of our community, over \$13,000 was raised - funding not only Latoya's place, but also two more full scholarships, and a partial fourth scholarship.

Latoya attended in April and described it as "the best time," making new friends, trying new challenges, and growing in confidence. Her mum shared how the experience boosted Latoya's pride, connection, and independence.

At Outward Bound, we believe challenge is for everyone. Your support ensures young people like Latoya aren't left behind - and that their potential is given the chance to shine.

CYRUS' EXPERIENCE

Cyrus Holloway was 17 when he was put forward for an Outward Bound scholarship through his school. He agreed without much thought, but reality hit the moment he arrived in Anakiwa and handed over his phone for a full digital detox. Before Outward Bound, he admits he was spending too much time online and struggling to find his place.

That wake-up call was exactly what he needed. Alongside 12 other students, Cyrus spent each day tramping, climbing and navigating as a team. Crawling out of a sleeping bag before dawn was tough, but it revealed something new: "Before the course, I would stop when things got hard. On the course, I couldn't give up. I found an extra gear."

Cyrus also discovered confidence. "I never thought I'd be comfortable leading or speaking up. Now I do it without even thinking." At home he began stepping up too, taking more initiative without being asked. His mum Anna noticed the change instantly: "There is less hesitation, less second-guessing. He pushes through now."

Not long after he returned home from his course, Cyrus was named Head Boy of his school - the youngest of seven kids and the first in his whānau to hold the role. Next year, he plans to study health science at the University of Auckland. He says he'll take the Outward Bound mindset with him - a gift made possible by generous donors that helped fund his scholarship.

The parent and subsidiary are both registered as charitable entities under the Charities Act 2019.

PURPOSE OF ENTITIES

Outward Bound Trust of New Zealand, incorporated in November 1997 under the Trusts Act 2019, is the operational arm of the Group and includes all revenue and expenditure associated with promoting, administering and running all courses.

Outward Bound Trust of New Zealand Foundation, incorporated in October 2001 under the Trusts Act 2019, is the funding arm for the Trust. Income and capital from the Endowment and Special Funds held within the Foundation are available to the Trust for financial assistance of student scholarships, and for operational grants in support of running Outward Bound courses.

NOTES

There have been three sets of financial statements prepared and audited for the year ended 30 June 2025 - Outward Bound Trust of New Zealand (Trust), Outward Bound Trust of New Zealand Foundation (Foundation) and for the consolidated Group (Group). The following information is applicable to all three entities.

The full financial statements, which are presented in New Zealand dollars, have been prepared in accordance with generally accepted accounting practice in New Zealand (NZ GAAP). They comply with Public Benefit Entity International Public Sector Accounting Standards ("PBE IPSAS") and other applicable financial reporting standards as appropriate that have been authorised for use by the External Reporting Board for Not-For-Profit entities.

The following financial information has been extracted from the full financial statements for the year ending 30 June 2025, approved by the Board on 3 October 2025. As such, this extraction of information cannot be expected to provide as complete an understanding of the financial position, performance and cash flows as provided in the full financial statements.

It is not intended that this information be classed as Summary Financial Accounts under PBE FRS43 of the Financial Reporting Act 2013.

The Group's auditors, Grant Thorton, have issued an unqualifed opinion for all three entities. Head to our website for full copies of financial statements and statements of service performance.
