

## Pediatric Clinical Trials: Questions to Consider

Asking questions and communicating with the Principal Investigator and Study Coordinator will help you feel confident in your decision. Here are some questions you might want to ask:

What is the purpose	of the trial?
Why is my child a goo	od candidate for this trial?
How does this invest	igational treatment differ from what my child is currently receiving?
What are the benefits, if any, to my child?	
What are the risks/po	otential side effects (both short-term and long-term)?
Why do the research	ners believe that the treatment being studied may be better than the one
being used now? W placebo?	hy may it not be better? What are the chances my child could receive
What tests, medicine	es, or therapies will be administered?
How will we know if t	the investigational treatment is working?
How and when will w	ve be told about the trial's results?
Will my child need to	be hospitalized or see doctors at other locations?
How long will the tria	al last?
Will I have to pay for	any of the treatments or tests?
What costs will my h	ealth insurance cover?
Who pays the medica	al bills if my child is injured in the trial?

Are any personal cos	sts such as meals, compensation for time away from work, or gas paid for

Who will provide info	rmation and support to my child and me during the trial?
Can I speak to some	one else not involved in the trial?
