CLASS ACTION ABOUT STOLEN WAGES IN WESTERN AUSTRALIA

The Federal Court of Australia has ordered that this notice be published for the information of persons who might be members of the class on whose behalf the action is brought and may be affected by the action.

ABOUT: Mr Mervyn Street has brought a case in the Federal Court against the Western Australian Government on behalf of all Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples who weren't paid all their wages or money between 1936 and 1972. The Western Australian Government is defending the case. The case is called a "class action" because Mr Street is bringing the case for anyone who was not given all of his or her pay or money. Mr Street's lawyers are Shine Lawyers, and they are helping him run the case. A company called Litigation Lending Services is currently paying the costs of bringing this class action against the Western Australian government in return for repayment of those costs, plus a maximum commission of 20% of any money recovered if the class action is successful.
