In 1992, the Whitney Museum in New York held the first retrospective of the artist's work and many have been staged since, including a major survey at the Brooklyn Museum in 2005, at the Brandt Foundation in New York in 2019, as well as at the Foundation Louis Vuitton in Paris from 2018-2019. In 2018, the Brooklyn Museum also hosted a one-work show of *Untitled* (1982), which had sold in 2017 for a record price of \$110,487,500. As of January 21, 2021, Jean-Michel Basquiat's auction records remain led by the aforementioned sale of *Untitled* (1982), followed by *Untitled* (1982), which sold for \$57,285,000 in 2016 and *Dustheads* (1982), which sold for \$48,843,750 in 2013.

Basquiat idolized Andy Warhol since his SAMO days, and had become one of the iconic Pop artist's closest friends. Warhol's untimely death in 1987 greatly disturbed the young artist, and in 1988 he was found dead of an overdose in his NoHo loft in downtown Manhattan.
