FIRST LESSON

James 1:2-8,16-18

If any of you is lacking in wisdom, ask God, who gives to all generously and ungrudgingly, and it will be given you. But

ask in faith, never doubting, for the one who doubts is like a wave of the sea, driven and tossed by the wind; for the doubter, being double-minded and unstable in every way, must not expect to receive anything from the Lord. Do not be deceived, my beloved. Every generous act of giving, with every perfect gift, is from above, coming down from the Father of lights, with whom there is no variation or shadow due to change. In fulfilment of his own purpose he gave us birth by the word of truth, so that we would become a kind of first fruits of his creatures.

SECOND LESSON

TODAY'S MUSIC

The **Opening Voluntary** is by Dobrinka Tabikova, a Bulgarian-born composer living in London since 1991. She has been described as a composer of 'exciting, deeply moving' music (Washington Times), with 'glowing tonal harmonies and grand, sweeping gestures [which] convey a huge emotional depth' (The Strad). She has been commissioned by the Royal Philharmonic Society, BBC Radio 3 and the European Broadcasting Union. She has written numerous works for choir, both sacred and secular, as well as organ music. Of the piece heard today she writes "the contour of the melody in the Chorale is important, with a progressive ascent before the culmination, although he focus is mainly on the rich, dense chords."

The **Introit** is a setting of an old English text by the eminent UK organist Peter Hurford. As both a choir trainer and a concert artist, Hurford was a major figure in the music world, and produced a complete set of recordings of the works of J.S. Bach, among many others.

The **Preces & Responses** were written by Joanna Forbes L'Estrange, an English soprano, composer and choral director. A graduate in music of Oxford University, she began her career as a soprano and Musical Director of the award-winning a cappella group *The Swingles*, and her compositional output reflects her love of choral music, close harmony, and jazz.

Charles Villiers Stanford was a composer of great significance in the world of English music in the later part of the nineteenth and early twentieth centuries. As professor of composition at The Royal College of Music his students included Ralph Vaughan Williams, Herbert Howells and Charles Wood. His settings of the canticles for Morning and Evening Prayer remain staples in the repertoire, and his Easter anthem *Ye choirs of new Jerusalem* is one of his bestloved works.
