



Remembering on Memorial Day + Ascension Fun!

Dear Friends,

For most of my life, the biggest significance of Memorial Day was the beginning of summer. Of course, I knew it was also serious, but as a kid, the thrill of approaching vacation eclipsed the solemnity of the day.

This all changed for me as a young adult. My grandfather had invited me to join him at a Memorial Day event held at a small military cemetery on the outskirts of my hometown. At the time, he was in his 80's, and he had only recently started to share stories with us and others about his service in the US Navy at the peak of fighting in the Pacific during World War II. At this small ceremony, I watched my grandfather speak alongside other veterans. When they finished, a color guard played *Taps* while volunteers moved among the graves, leaving flowers and flags on each resting place.

As I watched the volunteers work, I was reminded that remembrance is holy work. For the first time, I saw my grandfather reflected in the rows of crosses stretching out before us. I realized the weight he carried, knowing that he had survived when many of his fellow sailors had not. And I understood that some time in the not too distant future, he too would join the ranks of those faithful service members we honor on Memorial Day. It was a forceful lesson that this was not a celebration of armed conflict, but rather a reminder that each and every person interred there had managed to act with integrity under horrific and brutal circumstances. many ways, the best way we could honor them is to remember in words and actions that these individuals had risked and even given their lives so that others could live.

This weekend, as we get ready to enjoy the sunshine and a brief respite from being indoors, I hope that you will find a way to honor all our service members. We have a short service on Monday at 8:45 AM (use this <u>link</u>), but even if you decide to sleep in, I hope you will share stories with your kids, remembering both our loved ones and countless others who have given their lives for another's sake. In our tradition, we know the value of this gift, for as Jesus says, "no one has greater love than this, to lay down one's life for one's friends" (John 15:13).
