So she ran and went to Simon Peter and the other disciple, the one whom Jesus loved, and said to them, "They have taken the Lord out of the tomb, and we do not know where they have laid him." John 20:1-2

Dear Friends in Christ,

It is with deep joy and affection that I write to you in anticipation of the Great Fifty Days of Easter.

New life is all around us. Flowers are popping up throughout the cathedral close (and even through cracks in the sidewalks)! Restoration continues on the north and south porches of the cathedral with new finial installation nearing completion. We are looking forward to many wonderful programs at the cathedral this spring and a fantastic celebration of our common life at the Pentecost picnic. This is all good news.

At the same time, new life seems far off for many of us. Continuing news of devastating natural disasters, war, violence and civil unrest continue to tear apart the lives of many of God's children. Daily struggles with illness and addiction remain part of our human experience. With bad news on TV day after day, it is easy to give up hope for a better tomorrow. How do we, as people of faith, make sense out of all the beauty and wonder and pain and suffering that exist at the same time in our lives?

The liturgies of Holy Week and Eastertide help us to remember that suffering and joy are both a part of the life of faith. We recall the passion, death and resurrection of Christ as we come to terms with our own suffering, the suffering of the world, and, at the same time, the deep hope and joy we have knowing that resurrection is just around the corner. We recognize the tension and divisions in our world and renew our commitment to living lives of hope in the midst of our trials.

Perhaps we have become so familiar with the Easter story, that we have forgotten how shocking it is. When Mary Magdalene discovered that the tomb was empty, she felt lost. She ran and told two of the disciples that Jesus' body had been taken and she did not know where! Can you relate to feeling lost sometimes, even though you believe that the Lord is Risen? That is how the first Easter felt.

Resurrection is shocking because it happens when we least expect it. When things are tough, suddenly we discover that the stone has been rolled away while we were not looking. A new day is dawning. God in Christ is awakening us to the open and empty tomb, by the power of the Holy Spirit. Death is conquered, we are free, Christ has won the victory!

SUNDAY SERVICE SCHEDULE

Traditional Mass 8:00AM

The 8:00 service is a spoken Mass, using traditional language.

Cathedral for Kids 9:15AM

A service for the young—and the young at heart! The Mass is engaging for smaller children and adults alike and offers teaching on themes that connect our prayer life to spiritual and social learning.

Choral Mass 11:15AM

The 11:15 Choral Mass is a full cathedral service featuring choral music. The preaching relates the scriptures to our daily lives, and the music is carefully chosen to relate to the themes of the season.

Choral Evensong 4:00PM

(usually the first Sunday of the month; check incarnationgc.org/music for dates)

Choral Evensong is a service in which the ‘song’ of choral voices is heard at the ‘even’ point between the active day and restful night, allowing listeners time for restful contemplation.

Welcome to the Rev. Adam Bucko

The cathedral is thrilled to announce that the Rev. Adam Bucko will be joining our staff this summer! Adam was ordained to the Sacred Order of Deacons by Bishop Provenzano in January, and his Ordination to the Priesthood will take place at the cathedral on September 14.

Adam has been an influential voice in the movement for the recovery and renewal of Christian Contemplative Spirituality as well as the growing New Monasticism movement. He is also the co-founder of the Reciprocity Foundation, which serves homeless and marginalized youth in New York City.

One of Adam's primary roles at the cathedral will be the development of a new initiative, the Center for Spiritual Imagination, which we plan to launch in September. For a thousand years, cathedrals have been sites of pilgrimage, places of holy hospitality that nourish the soul and spark spiritual insights. Through a rich variety of innovative gatherings, programs and services, the Center for Spiritual Imagination will be a catalyst for the integration of contemplative prayer and just practice in daily life.

Spiritual Formation for Adults

Who doesn't love a good mystery? Trying to figure out how all the pieces of the puzzle fit together and the ultimate joy and relief when the mystery has finally been solved.

The Great Fifty Days of Easter is the time when the church invites us to live into the very mysteries of our faith. Our reflection over these next fifty days is to ask questions like "What does all of this mean to me? What does it mean for us to be a 'resurrection people'?"

The process of reflection, meaning and discernment that takes place over the fifty days is often called "mystagogy", a Greek word meaning "living into the mysteries". Plato used the term "mystagogy" to describe the intellectual penetration of truth. St Augustine of Hippo believed that mystagogy is an oral art of making connections between imagery and meaning; sacred scripture, the natural world, human culture, and the words and actions of liturgy.

Come join us at the Dean's Forum during Fellowship in Faith as together we discern what it means for us to live into the mysteries of our faith and to become a resurrection people with Alleluia as our song!
