These delicious shellfish are a must-have in summer. You can try them at Japanese-style restaurants and seafood izakayas (Japanese pubs) in Noto and Kanazawa.



Iwagaki Oysters (in season April-August) Noto's Iwagaki oysters are slightly larger than average and have a rich flavor. Perfect for sashimi, beachside broiling, and sushi.



Turban shells (in season June-September) The larger ones tend to be more than 10cm in size. Can be eaten raw as sashimi or cooked in their own shells.



Abalone (in season July-September) A high-quality ingredient with a firm texture. Good as sashimi, steak, or salted and steamed with sake. Summer Japanese Sweets

Tsuru-no-maru Rest Area Open for Business 1

In April, a new rest area opened in Kanazawa Castle Park. Created with the concept of "a space surrounded by history" in mind, the building features full glass windows on all sides which allow for a beautiful panorama view of Kanazawa Castle's famous Hishiyagura Watchtower, Gojukken-nagaya, and Hashizume-mon Gate.

Inside the building there is a display space featuring images of Kanazawa Caste and Kenrokuen Garden through the four seasons and a visual re-telling of the history of Kanazawa Castle from its initial construction to the present day, as well as a resting space where wagashi sweets and tea are available. Perfect for resting after a long walk through Kanazawa Castle Park or Kenrokuen.

3. 1,300th Anniversary of Founding of Shirayama Shrine

Mount Hakusan, a 2702m tall mountain which straddles and towers over the three prefectures of Ishikawa, Fukui, and Gifu, is said to be one of the three holy mountains of Japan, alongside Tateyama and Mount Fuji. The white-capped peak of the mountain has captivated people since time immemorial, and in time it became known as a religious symbol, "the White Seat of the Gods' In the year 717, a Buddhist monk named Taichou founded a small shrine at the peak of Hakusan, and from there the worship of Hakusan spread rapidly, resulting in many shrines to Hakusan being built throughout the entire country. Hakusan, which to this day continues to captivate people with its beauty, is home to the Hakusan National Park, a 47,700 hectare park enjoyed by many mountain climbers, as well as a UNESCO-recognized wildlife preservation area, its beautiful national environment gaining praise even from overseas. On this year, the 1,300th anniversary of the founding of the shrine, commemorative events are planned from spring until mid-August in Hakusan and the surrounding areas, so why not participate and enjoy the beautiful nature of Hakusan while learning about the history and beliefs of this area?
