On the evening of Friday 27 October, more than 600 quests stepped into an Alice in Wonderland themed event to celebrate 25 years of our national children's hospital, and the foundation that supports it.

There was something for everyone – from the whimsical to the magical, from the beautiful to the guirky. Held at Spark Arena in Auckland, quests were welcomed through an entrance tunnel into a welcome zone that included themed roaming characters - including of course a mad hatter and Cheshire cat, a 180 degree photo booth experience, a virtual reality wall and VR goggles, and champagne bar. A bespoke diamond necklace was designed especially for the event, featuring 25 diamonds, and was raffled off on the night.

MC's Antonia Prebble and Mike Puru expertly quided quests through the evening's entertainment, including performances from Hollie Smith, Tiki Taane, The Royal New Zealand Ballet, Bubblegum Hip Hop Group, The Black Quartet, Richard O'Brien, Shane Cortese and the 8-Track Band, and Sweet Mix Kids.

The event was a spectacular success, raising more than \$540,000 for our national children's hospital. Money raised will support vital initiatives for Starship Child Health.

Christmas appeal update DAISY'S MUM AND DAD SAY "THANK YOU FOR HELPING CHILDREN LIKE OUR LITTLE GIRL!"



What a wonderful response we received from thousands of you over Christmas in reply to the letters Brad wrote you about little Daisy in November.

Christmas is a time when people always give incredibly generously to support the ill and injured children Starship cares for, and last year was no exception.

At the last count your combined donations to our Christmas appeal totalled \$202,773. This money will now be used to purchase urgently needed

equipment like the specialist NICU equipment that saved Daisy's life.

As you might remember, Daisy was born 17 weeks premature, fighting for her life and completely reliant on life-support equipment.

"I knew that babies born before 23 weeks usually don't survive." said her mum Katie. "Words can't describe the fear we felt. The whole time we knew that things could change very quickly, and we might

lose her."

Daisy was so tiny that she weighed just 545 grams, barely more than a block of butter. Her lungs couldn' breathe on their own and her skin was so paper-thin it could tear if she was touched, so mum and dad weren't even allowed to pick her up and cuddle her.

After a gruelling 102 day stay in Starship's NICU, Daisy finally went home. One year on, and she's doing incredibly well.

We caught up with parents Katie and Neil who told how Daisy is hitting all of her developmental milestones on cue. Katie also had this wonderful message of thanks for you and our other kind and caring supporters.

"To us, Starship means hope. To all worried and anxious parents Starship, means hope that there is a chance to survive and live, hope that it may be alright in the end.

The word Starship is also coloured with gratitude.















Gratitude, thanks and appreciation that we are so lucky to have this amazing resource and amazing team of people committed to helping every child. Starship makes all the difference.

We owe our little family to Starship and the NICU. If it wasn't for them Daisy simply wouldn't have survived. We are so grateful to everyone at Starship and the people who support them. We will be absolutely forever grateful!"

And of course, it goes without saying that we are forever grateful too. Without wonderful supporters like you, at Christmas and right throughout the year, we would never be able to provide every child who comes through our doors with the excellent quality of care every one of us would hope for our own precious children.

The long, Latin words sound frightening enough on their own: hypoplastic right ventricle, tricuspid atresia. But in many ways they hide an even scarier truth. Stripped back to basics. Cameron was

born with half a heart. Imagine hearing that is what your son has?

You've probably seen Cameron featured in some of our appeals and communications over the last year or so. That's because Cameron is a little star as far as we're concerned.

If you have caught any of these steps along Cameron's journey, you'll have some idea of the gruelling treatment he's been through since the very first day he came into the world. Four open heart surgeries, months and months in PICU, three years in virtual home-lockdown to avoid infection, and several frightening, life-threatening setbacks along the way.

He's grown up in a world so different to most little boys. But despite it all, Cameron has just finished his second term at school! Isn't that amazing news?

Thanks to the incredible support we receive from good people from all over New Zealand – people just like you – we're able to keep up with advances in research and technology, and ensure that our amazing medical teams have the very best equipment and facilities at their disposal. Because that's the way to give children like Cameron the world-class care they need.

All of our medical staff know how huge a role you play in making this possible, and parents like Rachael and Nick do too. In fact Rachael has a message of thanks for you and everyone who gives to Starship...

Gearing up! A QUICK LOOK AT SOME OF THE CUTTING EDGE EQUIPMENT YOU HELPED BUY IN 2017...

Thanks to your generosity we've been able to keep up with the fast changing pace of medical research and advancing technology by purchasing these critically important pieces of equipment: Zonare Transducer Probe: Helping us produce even clearer images of tiny veins, enabling nurses to insert IV lines more easily and effectively, and with much less stress and pain for little ones.

Olympic Brainz Monitor: Observes brain waves while patients are unconscious. Essential in the early diagnosis of harmful brain seizures that might otherwise go undetected for years.

Pressure Relieving Mattresses: Protecting critically unwell little ones from potentially disfiguring pressure injuries.



High-Spec Infant Delivery Systems: Streamlines procedures for babies who need immediate incubation.

Chester Chest Training Mannequin: Helps our medical teams learn the difficult art of inserting venous cannulas and intercostal chest drains in tiny patients.

Portable Ultrasound Machine: Enables us to maintain the very highest levels of intensive care, even while our patients are in the air.

ECMO Trainer: ECMO (Extra Corporeal Membrane Oxygenation) is a machine that replaces both the heart and lungs during life-saving surgery. Starship is the only place in New Zealand where ECMO is provided for children. So our training programme is vital. This ECMO trainer helps our teams to practice this complex, high-risk, but lifesaving emergency procedure.

And more... Of course, there is more than we can really show on this page, including important equipment and supplies for Starship's National Air Ambulance Service, and ongoing staff training to meet the needs of the most challenging and complex cases. In honour of baby Kate

"THE FEELING OF EMPTY ARMS WAS LIKE NO OTHER. I JUST WANTED SOMETHING TO HOLD.

When young parents Clare and Dougal Montgomerie lost their baby, they were given a teddy to hold, a simple but profound gesture that sparked an idea in Clare's mind. Since then, Clare has made "Kate Bears" to be given to the parents of every baby who passes away in Auckland. She delivers them on Christmas Eve. This year would have been Kate's 4th birthday, and Clare decided to hold a Teddy Bear's picnic to fundraise for another cuddle cot for parents who lose a child, and to cosmetically refurbish the baby loss room in the Women's Assessment Unit with new furniture and a fresh paint job. This is Clare's story in her own words:



"On the 24th of June 2013 our lives, hopes and dreams changed forever. Our beautiful daughter, Kate Danielle Montgomerie, was lost at 36 weeks gestation after a very rare placental abruption.

Her doctor's tried desperately to save her, but unfortunately it was not to be. The staff became like family. But the feeling of empty arms was like no other. I just wanted something to hold, as it wasn't going to be Kate for very long. It had to be something that was with her from birth. That teddy holds such special memories. That's where Kate's legacy and the idea for Kate's Bears started.

We will continue making them for as long as we are alive, and we hope Kate's siblings will keep it up. We are very blessed to have had Kate in our lives. She changed us positively and has made us so grateful for the people in our lives.
