

e want to express our heartfelt appreciation to Sydney Airport and Sydney Community Foundation for allowing the Thrive Youth Employment Hub to be created.

Thrive is an innovative mobile service for newly arrived young people aged 16-23 from multicultural backgrounds.

Bid for Good has meant that 2Connect Youth & Community can now reach out to newly arrived migrant and refugee young people in their first six months of life in Australia and this would not have been possible without this grant. We've appointed a qualified and experienced youth worker to coordinate and mentor students. Improving their education and employability skills, these young people will have a greater sense of belonging and increase their chances of getting a job and to thrive in Australia.

Hospitality is a growth area in the suburbs surrounding Sydney Airport, so the first keen group of young people from multicultural backgrounds have started accredited training in barista skills and food handling, so they can access local employment in these areas. Sixteen young people, from nine different cultural backgrounds, including Mongolian, Persian, Arabic speaking, Filipino and Chinese cultures, are currently halfway through the program.

Participants have completed workshop sessions on writing a resume and have finished their first outline via one-on-one interviews. Training courses are followed by individual mentoring, interview skills, completing job applications and cold-calling local businesses about work opportunities.

So far, there have already been positive outcomes. Our students tell us they have new confidence in applying for jobs. They are also discovering their own skills and attributes, even though some of them have never had a paid job or any work experience. It is anticipated there will be some excellent long-term outcomes in employment from the Thrive Youth Employment Hub.

have worked at Kogarah Intensive English
Centre (IEC) for seven years. My job is to teach
English to newly arrived secondary school aged
students before entering mainstream high
school in Australia. We also help with the transition
process and assist with welfare and wellbeing
issues.

The students have arrived in Australia over the last eight months. Some have only been here for two months. The challenges they face vary depending on their situation, however, some common challenges include language barriers, relationship building, confidence and integration.

This grant helps students to form new friendships with others similar in age sharing their challenges. It also gives them an opportunity to experience vocational training and understand the options available to them. They learn there are services out there for them and people willing to assist. Students received their Certificate II in Hospitality. They can use their new qualifications when looking for work as well as using it for further education.

Students earn a certificate that has meaning. They accomplish something at a time in their lives where everything seems difficult. It has given them confidence to become active participants in society.

As an example of the impact this program has, two years ago, I had an 18 year old student from Thailand

in the group. He struggled to learn the academic language needed for further study in a secondary school. He was lost and felt overwhelmingly stressed about his future, but working together he completed the course. When he left the IEC, I had not heard from him for a while. Then, four months later I took a class to visit Ultimo TAFE and we saw him in a hospitality kitchen! He was completing further study in the hospitality sector because of the course. His TAFE lecturer said he was his star pupil. He was happy, confident and had found his calling.

his grant is an important contribution to supporting our Employment Service to assist people seeking asylum find work. Employment changes lives and nothing gives people back their independence and dignity like working to support themselves and their family.

For many families, employment is the only source of income while they await the outcome of their application for protection in Australia. It is an uncertain and unsettling process, which can take years. Currently the Government is withdrawing assistance for people seeking asylum at a rate not seen since we opened our doors more than twenty years ago. Never before has the need for employment been greater.

Our Employment Service has assisted hundreds of people find meaningful jobs with the support of our partner employers who recognise the value people seeking asylum bring to their organisations. We have developed effective, sustainable relationships with employers, training providers and community sector partners that help us foster long-term employment success.

This grant will support our Employment Coordinator to extend our network of partner employers in industries aligned with the needs of people we support. These include: administration and customer service, hospitality, childcare, engineering, factories and warehousing, commercial cleaning, IT, and retail.

Our 90+ partner employers include LUSH Fresh Handmade Cosmetics, St Vincent's Private Hospital, Transdev, Gelato Messina, Michael Page and Scalabrini Village nursing homes.

The Sydney Airport grant will also support people seeking asylum to access workshops which coach people on what to expect in an Australian workplace. Partner employers run sessions at our centre, such as How to Succeed in the Australian Workforce, Personal Branding - Bringing Your Personality to an Interview, Building Your Professional Network, Using Your Skills to Stand Out in the Jobs Market, Navigating the Employment Market.

By partnering with employers and providing tailored transitions to employment, we have been highly successful in placing people into paid employment.

Thank you for your valuable contribution to this critical program supporting people seeking asylum in finding work.

'What Employers Expect' workshop was held this year at the recruitment firm Michael Page in Sydney's CBD.

Participants enjoyed a day of harbour views in the executive boardroom, presentations from senior recruitment experts, one-on-one resume and career planning conversations with recruiters in their industry.

One attendee, Diego*, a 40-year-old engineer from Venezuela, had only been able to secure cleaning work in Australia despite his engineering qualifications being recognised. Imagine his surprise when he was matched with a recruiter who also happened to be a Venezuelan engineer! He presented so well that Michael Page put him forward for a Construction Manager role with a state government department. His interviewers were so impressed that they made an exception to hire him as a non-resident.

Supported by a \$10,000 grant from Sydney Community Foundation and Bid for Good the workshop series for asylum seekers gives candidates increased employment prospects through coaching on what to realistically expect in an Australian workplace. Participants report a greater sense of belonging, confidence and independence in navigating local industries.

Thank you Sydney Airport and Sydney Community Foundation for helping us continue to support asylum seekers on their journey to find meaningful work.

he whole Asylum Seekers Centre team supported me in my darkest days. In 2017 I came to the Asylum Seekers Centre with work rights and asked for help in job hunting. My job advisor helped me, improved my resume and wrote a cover letter for me.

Through Asylum Seekers Centre I got my first medical receptionist job. My job advisor helped me with an interview and sent me to Dress for Success, where I got beautiful business attire for my interview.

Through this job, I was able to pay my expenses and, above all, I got experience. This job opened doorways for me to enter the medical field, which was a dream come true for me. My daughter would never have been to school if it was not for the Asylum Seekers Centre.

Without their help I would never have been able to get a good job. I learned so much from my job advisor, that now, I am working at Fairfield Hospital, and am on my way to become practice manager at the hospital.

ress for Success Sydney helps over 3,000 women who have come from situations of generational or situational poverty. We work to empower women to achieve economic independence by providing a network of support, professional attire and the development tools to help women thrive in work and life.

With the \$10,000 grant from Sydney Airport and Sydney Community Foundation's 'Bid for Good' campaign, we were able to renovate our Sydney warehouse to give our clients a boutique experience.

Clients love coming to the new space, it gives them a sense of dignity and calm, and we get more referrals. Our new showroom has transformed the client experience and has been a big help in improving their confidence as they set out on the road to employment.

Having a beautiful, calm environment helps relax women so they get the best out of their visit. It helps client's self-esteem. You can see the confidence increase through the change in posture, smiles and laughter. We give them belief in themselves.

Most women are looking to restart their job search process after being unemployed as a result of redundancy, difficulty getting through the interview process due to gender, age or race discrimination, a health crisis, after taking a career break to raise children, divorce, family violence or time spent in a correctional facility.

Clients come to our offices to get assistance with their job search, as part of our offering we provide them clothes for interviews, additional outfits once they get the job and clothes for general life requirements.

It is amazing to hear the stories of what brings people into our offices looking for help, and it's even more special to share in their happiness when they get the job.

She was matched with Pauline, the perfect stylist to connect with her creativity and tinted hair, and put together a look that reflected her design vibe. She started a new job to cover the rent and is rebuilding her start-up on the side.

rana NSW Inc. has been working with vulnerable people, the disadvantaged and socially isolated for 50 years. In 2008 we identified a huge gap in domestic violence (DV) services provided in the Sutherland Shire and employed our own case worker.

Without government funding, we fundraise so we can continue to support the women who need us. Struggling to keep our doors open, we began exploring the possibility of a social enterprise after learning more and more community organisations in NSW were going down this path.

While setting up our own social enterprise coffee cart with a grant from Sutherland Shire Council, a local church organisation gifted us their established café in Jannali. We saw an opportunity to build it into a thriving local business and use the profits to support our Orana DV and other vital community services.

This café was in dire need of a facelift. The Sydney Airport and Sydney Community Foundation Bid for Good grant put us in a position to renovate and rebrand. With the help of local businesses and the community we began renovations.

I am pleased to say our new Thyme Café has increased its turnover three fold. We've been able to employ staff and create a wonderful atmosphere where we provide great food and coffee for a cause. The business is growing and we hope we will soon be in a position where we are making a profit to put back into our local services.

he Thyme Café is great for Orana because it gives the women I work with an opportunity to volunteer as a kitchen hand, barista, or cashier to learn and practice new skills in hospitality. This can be helpful for gaining confidence and a sense of independence while they rebuild a life free from violence.

With the Bid for Good grant we created a fresh and inviting place for people to come and meet, socialise and offer opportunities for people to volunteer and learn new skills. Eventually Thyme Café will hopefully be a source of income to help run self-funded sustainable programs.

There is a wonderful playroom that offers opportunities for parenting groups and services to create social connection and build stronger communities.

I love my job at Orana because it gives me the opportunity to make a difference to the Sutherland Shire community that I grew up in. I am passionate about helping women impacted by domestic violence because not only was I one of them, but I know the difference a service like Orana Inc. made at one of the lowest times in my life.

Having a place to turn to in times of need can make all the difference and be the catalyst for recreating and rebuilding a safe and fruitful life. I describe my role at Orana as an agent for hope.

MALABAR MIDWIVES | THANKS

e would like to thank Sydney Airport and Sydney Community Foundation for supporting the Royal Hospital for Women Foundation.

The grant is being used to support our Malabar Midwifery Service and our Young Parent's Group. Without this funding we would not have been able to continue our group this year and our families are so grateful.

The program supports young Aboriginal families with children from birth to 18 months through a weekly playgroup at the Malabar Mother and Baby clinic. Each week, we present a different topic related to parenting such as feeding, mental health or child development as well as providing a safe environment for parents to yarn and connect with local families.

The group has allowed us to engage vulnerable families and it has provided us with more opportunities to deliver relevant universal health services and parenting education. The participants have direct access to a Child and Family Health nurse, our Social

Worker and our Aboriginal Health Worker so we can better manage any psychosocial stressors that they might be encountering.

The grant has helped us to cover the cost of providing lunch each week, to take the families on excursions and to purchase culturally appropriate books and toys for the children. We are now able to treat our families on special occasions such as Mother's Day which has been greatly appreciated as many of our parents have limited financial and social support.

It has been lovely to watch friendships blossom within the group with many of our graduating families continuing to meet up in the community for play dates and birthday celebrations.
